Montreal, Oct. 20.—The annual inter-collegiate games of McGill University took place today at the M. A. A. grounds. The student body turned out practically en masse to witness the events, as the team to participate in the annual Canadian inter-collegiate championships is chosen from those who take places in the inter-class games.

Stanley, runner from Prince Edward Island, won the quarter, equaling the time made by the Rev. J. D. Morrow, when he was a student at McGill. McKee, another Prince Edward Islander, won both the high jump and the pole vault, and in the latter event J. Smith, from the same province from Cape Breton, won all three weight events—discus, hammer and shot put—and in each hung up a new mark.

NELSON'S VICTORY WAS ROYALLY CELEBRATED BY THE ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY

The Great Triumph at Trafalgar Formed Theme of Song, Story and Oration at Pleasant Commemorative Gathering last Evening.

A large number of the members of St. George's Society gathered in their hall on Charlotte street last evening to do honor to the memory of the hero of Trafalgar, and invoke the spirit of patriotism and good fellowship. A splendid programme had been arranged for the occasion, and it was carried out with the swing and dash that characterized the performances of the British fleet on Trafalgar Day.

The principal feature was an address by Col. E. T. Sturdee, in which he gave an interesting and thrilling narrative of Nelson's last and greatest victory. Brief addresses were made by Judge Ritchie, president of St. Patrick's Society, James Jack, representing St. Andrew's Society and there were patriotic songs by G. S. Mayes, Robert Seely and others, as well as recitations and musical selections.

Mayor Frink presided and opened the celebration with a short speech. After referring to the occasion of the gathering, he dwelt on the importance of keeping alive the memory of the great historic events which had marked the growth of the Empire, as well as the memory of the heroes who by their daring and self-sacrifice had contributed so much to the upbuilding of the Empire. Among all the men Englishmen delighted to honor few appeared more powerfully to the imagination than the great admiral who died at Trafalgar, after achieving probably the most momentous victory in the history of British arms.

Messrs. J. H. Wilson and F. Punter, then rendered a number of musical selections on various instruments, the merits of their performance being testified to by round on round applause. E. Chapel followed with a song entitled Asleep On the Deep, which was well received.
