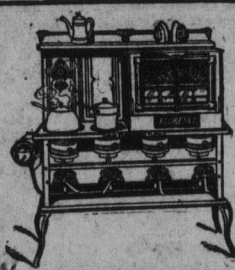

SCHOOL FOR DEAF CLOSING EXERCISES HELD YESTERDAY

Large Number of Visitors Present — Uncommon and Interesting Programme — The Prize Winners—Great Praise For Teachers.

The closing exercises of the School for the Deaf in Lancaster were held yesterday afternoon in the assembly room. A large crowd was present to witness the exercises which were very interesting, and rather uncommon, being out of the ordinary of other school closing exercises. In this fact that "from the known" to the unknown was exemplified by "the only" the school are readily responded to their teachers, who deserve much credit for the noble work they are doing.

Following is the programme:
1. Introductory remarks by Principal Tobias Brill.
2. Demonstration of class work: Junior teacher, Miss J. Pine. Intermediate teacher, E. E. Prince. Advanced teacher, Principal Brill.
After which the prizes were awarded by J. H. Brown, supervisor, to the winners in the different classes as follows:
Junior—Prize awarded to Margaret Larson.
Intermediate—Prize awarded to Diana Gellatly.
Advanced—Prize to Lorne Steeves.
Senior—Prize awarded to Wallace Walsh.

Baxter prizes—1st, general progress, Wallace Walsh 2nd, good fellowship, Albert Leger.

The principal in his opening remarks touched on the nature of the work being done, and made a general review of the year's work.

"This school was little understood by the public, who sometimes made such enquiries 'What is the use of the raised letters? Can children laugh or cry as others; or could they make much noise? Here the principal remarked that he never knew of an instance yet when he had to ask the children to make more noise. (Laughter.)

"Dumbness," the speaker added, "was a result of deafness, simply due to the children not hearing the remarks or the voice of others; they then had no desire to imitate." However, the children had learned to understand by watching the movements of the lips of one speaking. This he exemplified by bringing up a little child on the platform. When he spoke the child would watch closely the movement of his lips, and in turn could understand, even writing on a blackboard what the speaker had spoken.

He outlined the methods of teaching by utilizing charts with pictures which lead from "known to unknown," by movements of the lips, which spelled out a word, the children writing these on the board. All the teachers gave a lesson to the pupils for the benefit of the audience.

It was surprising to learn how the little ones responded to signs, and were well versed in geography, arithmetic, English spelling and even in book-keeping.

The teachers were very technical in their methods and had a generous response from their classes, silent however, but showing they understood the "visible signs" on a blackboard. These teachers certainly deserve all praise, as they are doing a noble work, and showing they understood the "visible signs" on a blackboard. The children are versed in the current events of the day and distinguish the Allied and Central Powers; the leaders of each, history of the world, know as much as children in other schools in some subjects.

Only one boy was in the senior department, but the principal said "this written English was much better than many boys of Grade VIII. in other schools.

The exercises were brought to a close by the National Anthem in signs given by three little girls, Eva Leger, Constance Cumming and Dorothy Riley. This exercise of "sign language" was very picturesque as the actors moved with rhythm and precision on the sounds of the words.

Thus another successful year has been accomplished in this school and complimentary remarks were passed around regarding the efficiency and ability of Principal Brill and his staff of teachers.

ABOMINABLE ROADS IN ST. JOHN RIVER DISTRICT

Hon. B. Frank Smith Tells How Minister of Public Works For Gloucester County Has Shamefully Neglected Certain Districts — Tourists Driven From Parts of Province — Foster and Veniot Dare Not Hold Election in Carleton.

Fredericton, June 26.—Agricultural affairs are progressing quite favorably in Carleton county, according to the opinion of Hon. B. Frank Smith, who was visiting in the city. Grass is looking fairly well, and bids fair to produce a good hay crop. It will, in his opinion, be up to the average, and that means a lot, as Carleton county's hay is famous.



but very little attention.

When asked if there was any move being made to fill the vacancy in the representation of Carleton county in the Legislature, Mr. Smith said, "No." "There is no evidence whatever," he said, "that the government intended to fill the vacancy within the near future. The county has been deprived of one member since the beginning of the present term. Two sessions of the Legislature have been held, yet the government has made no move to give Carleton county its full representation in the House."

Government in Bad.

Continuing, he said: "It is not likely an appeal will be made very soon. The sentiment in Carleton county is daily growing stronger against the government. The roads in the back districts, and along many of the trunk lines, have not been touched this season. Had it not been for the fact that the weather, for the most part, has been favorable, in many places the roads would have been impassable. We have been living on promises for the past two years, and our people are tired of the diet. While there were between three and four hundred thousand dollars more expended on highways than in previous years, the counties of York and Carleton were given

Gloucester Petted.

"Gloucester county alone, in which the Minister of Public Works lives, received more for its roads than all the counties along the St. John river combined. This seems most unfortunate. Not only because it is an unfair position upon our own people along the highways, but as well from the standpoint of tourists, who have now practically abandoned their visits to towns and cities along the river, because of the dreadful condition of our highways. To verify this, one has only to make a trip from St. John to Edmundston, along the river, and it is safe to say one trip will be enough to convince the most skeptical that New Brunswick is sadly lacking in the movement for better roads, now so prominent in other provinces of the Dominion and in the New England States."

TOO MUCH PARTY POLITICS HERE, SAYS BLUE DEVIL

Should Only Be One Party in War—"War Will Last Until Somebody Licked and It Won't Be Us."

Montreal, June 26.—"A lot of people ask me how long the war is going to last. They want to pin me down to a date. Will it last three months? Six months? One year or ten years? We don't know and we don't care. This war will end when somebody's licked. We are not going to be licked."

These were the concluding words of a speech by Lieutenant Jean Cenal, of the Alpine Chasseurs delivered amid enthusiastic applause at the Windsor Hotel today on the occasion of the luncheon to the "Blue Devils" tendered by the citizens of Montreal, at which a large number of prominent men of the city were present.

Lieut. Cenal said that he had been asked to say what he thought of the Canadian people. He thought there was too much discussion about parties. "That is wrong. There is only one party in this war."

The "Blue Devils" leave this city for Ottawa tomorrow.

New York, June 26.—Percy Thomas, deputy international president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, announced tonight that he had received the following message from S. J. Koenekamp, president of the union, in Chicago: "You may announce that as soon as the Western Union Telegraph Company bonus is paid, strike may be matter of a few days. Joint committee meets here Friday to prepare final instructions for railroad and commercial telegraphers and electrical workers. The instructions will be mailed to reach all points by next Wednesday."

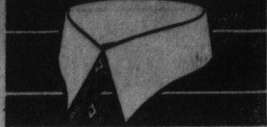

At Least He Is Not To Be Executed Before Oct. 25.

Montreal, June 26.—Aurele Veault, 18 year old murderer of a farmer and his infant son in the county of Pontiac, Quebec, and condemned to hang Friday at Brison, Quebec, has been granted a respite until October 26.

The grounds of the respite as explained in the judgement on the motion for an appeal to the full court of King's Bench, requested by the lawyers for the defence, are that, since the court does not sit until September, the convict cannot present his motion unless a respite is granted beyond that period.
