BIBLE SOCIETY IS NOW 100 YEARS IN EXISTENCE.

Rev. Dr. Gibson, of Toronto, Gives Interesting Facts.

The Founding of the Society Told Of--Influence Among the Tierra del Fuego Savages---In Old Days in England---Growth of the Society's Work.

Sunday morning, in connection with the centenary celebration of the British and Foreign Bible Society, Rev. Jesse Gib on, pastor of the First Baptist church, Toronto, occupied the pulpit of Germain street Baptist church and preached an eloquent sermon on behalf of that body. He took for his text Psalm lxxii, 6 and 17: 'He shall come down like rain upon the mown grass, as showers that water the earth. His name shall endure forever; His name shall be continued as Yong as the sun and men shall be blessed in Him, all nations shall call Him blessed." all nations shall call Him blessed."

Coming to the subject of his discourse, he said among other things that he was there to tell his hearers of the wonderful growth of that body, the hundredth auniversary of the founding of which they were celebrating. Just 100 years ago March 7 half a dozen earnest Christians pot in a recomposer the counting house met in a room over the counting house of a Mr. Hardcastle in London, where one of their number was telling a story that

of their number was telling a story that moved the rest to tears.

The story concerned the great need of the word of God in Wales, where many were hungering for it. The resolution was formed to supply that need, and the question arose, and if for Wales why not for the whole empire and the whole world? And so from that small beginning grew the British and Foreign Bible Society, a society that last year sent forth from its presses the enormous total of 500,000,000 presses the enormous total of 500,000,000 copies of the scriptures in 370 languages

The stupendous difficulty involved in this enormous work could hardly be estimated as in the majority of cases a lunguage had to be literally created. The testimony of Darwin after his first visit to Tierra De Fuego is to the effect that the inhabitants of that land were the most degraded of British ship was to touch on their shores. uch was the state of affairs when Tho Briggs was sent out by a missionary so ciety to labor among them. For four years of making a yearly contribution to the society which, he said, was worthy of any man's support merely from a utilitarian

But in the words of the old Hebrew prophet, the speaker asked his hearers to "leok to the pit from whence ye were digged." Caesar describes the ancient Britons as a race of bloodthirsty barbarians who were in the custom of offering human sacrifices to the god Woden. Not was there any improvement in the condi-tion of things till St. Columba landed on the shores of the island with his manuscript of the Gospel of St. John. From that time on the progress of the British Isles has ever been upward and all has been done through the dissemination of the word of God. And what the Bible has done for the English people it is capable of doing for any other nation that will embrace its principles and honor its
