CLASSIFICATION.

At the opening of each Term an effort is made to classify the pupils to the best advantage.

The daily marks are combined with the results of frequent written and oral examinations, and the scholarship is thus determined.

Unexcused absences from class are reckoned as failures. There are three grades of scholarship :—

FIRST GRADE-Thos	se whose	average	is from	6.5 to 10.
SECOND GRADE-	"	"	"	4.5 to 6.5
THIRD GRADE-+	41	"	below	4.5.

Students of the Junior Year who on the year's workhave obtained First Grade are allowed to advance to the Middle Year; those of the Second Grade are allowed to join the Middle Year on probation for one term, and in case they, do not improve their standing they are put back into the next Junior Year. Students of the Third Grade are required to go over the Year's work again. The same principle is applied in the case of students of the Middle year being advanced to the Senior Year.

By vote of the Faculty of Acadia College, First Grade Students of the Senior Year from Horton Collegiate Academy are admitted to the College as full matriculates, without examination, on presentation of a certificate from the Principal of the Academy.
