THE improvement of farm stock can hardly be too frequently brought before the mind of the farmer, and of all who feel any interest in the prosperity of the country. No individual of any observation, whose attention has been drawn to the subject, and who has had an opportunity of examining the quality and character of the stock reared by a vast majority of farmers, can fail to be forcibly impressed with its importance as a permanent, certain, and reliable means of largely increasing the aggregate wealth and resources of the whole country. This is no ordinary subject; and there can scarcely be any just reason why it should not deeply interest the farmers and arouse them to action. Each farmer should put the question directly to himself.

—"Have I in my possession neat cattle which possess the greatest combination of excellence, which are the most profitable for the dairy, which will mature early, and when no longer wanted for dairy and working purposes, will put on flesh with the least expense in feeding for the butcher? Have I the best sheep for fleece and carcass,—the best breed of swine,—those of quick growth and approved fattening qualities?" And if, on investigation, he becomes satisfied he is deficient in one or all of this description of animals, he should spare no pains to procure such at reasonable additional expense.
