Only one clasp at a time may be worn on the ribbon of the Long Service Medal and anyone being awarded a second or third clasp to the medal, must detach one awarded previously. The same applies to the star, which is worn in the centre of the Long Service Medal undress ribbon.

Any former member of the RCMP who has been awarded the Long Service Medal, may, if he possesses the necessary qualifications, apply for the Clasp and Star to which he feels his service entitles him. The application should be addressed in writing to the Commissioner, should indicate clearly the type of award desired and complete details as to qualifying eligible service.

As in the case of the RCMP Long Service Medal, the additional awards of clasp and star are not lightly won. Those who have earned them by long and irreproachable service may justifiably wear them with pride.
