After discussing its estimates for three hours without finding any way of meeting the demands of the city council that they be reduced by \$100,000, the board of education this morning at the suggestion of one of the trustees decided to ask Mayor E. S. Little to be present when the chairmen of the various committees presented their reports. The mayor was reached by telephone and immediately responded to the suggestion, bringing with him the city treasurer.

After a brief word of welcome and explanation, Mr. Coleridge called on Trustee Smith, as chairman of No. 1 committee, to make his report.

No. 1 committee, said Mr. Smith, after going carefully into its estimates, has made a reduction of \$6,425. "In one case, that of the auxiliary classes, we have made a reduction very reluctantly, cutting the appropriation from \$3,000 to \$1,000.
