

DOES NOT APPROVE
OF SALARY INCREASEFor Teachers at the Present
Time, Says Mayor Little.SPEAKS TO BOARD
Tells Trustees the City Must
Practice Every Economy.

After discussing its estimates for three hours without finding any way of meeting the demands of the city council that they be reduced by \$100,000, the board of education this morning suggested that the city must practice every economy.

Mayor Little, who is in the city, was present when the chairman of the board, Mr. Little, called on the board to make his report.

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CIVIC TAX RATE
WILL LIKELY BE
AROUND 38 MILLSRate Will Be Struck by Council
at Sitting This Afternoon.

With board of education estimates reviewed at a special session this morning, the city council will strike the tax rate for all purposes at 4 o'clock this afternoon. As there is only a reduction of one-third in the board's probable expenditures there is every probability of the tax rate being around 38 mills.

Estimates of the council at this morning's session were in the neighborhood of 23½ mills. The board of education estimates with the reductions effected today will be slightly below 15 mills.

R. B. Morley Tells Rotarians In Inter-
esting Address on "Safety First."

"Why a Safety League?" was the
theme upon which attention was di-
rected at the weekly luncheon of the
London Rotary Club, which was held
last evening at the home of Mrs. R. B.
Morley, general manager of the
Ontario Safety League, Toronto.

At the outset of his remarks, Mr.
Morley referred to the recent terrible
accident in Montreal, by which a little
girl lost her life by falling down a
manhole.

"The idea of safety," said the speaker,
"is as old as man. Every advance
made in the condition of man has been
brought about by a desire for increased
safety."

The Ontario Safety League was cre-
ated to put guards on careless habits.
They had taken the keynote of
their campaign the education of the
rising generation, which produced two
results: first, children brought to
more careful on the streets and in
the schools their lessons in prevention
of accidents would mean to thousands
of homes.

Referring to accidents in factories,
which cost the country \$7,700,000 last
year, Mr. Morley said:
"It is not enough to carry on an
accident prevention in an industrial
employer and employee must be to-
gether for the purpose of safety. The
long run, the worker who saves his life
or limb due to safety education or safe-
guards is a greater winner than the
employer who saves his costs."

There was a large attendance of Ro-
tarians, over which Vice-President
George Tumbler presided.

Association of Rotary Clubs, to be
