Writes of Father's Death.

Mrs. McRae of Chatham received the following letter from Capt. K. C. McLeod, chaplain of the 202nd Battalion, C. E. F., telling little Miss Mary McRae of the death of her father, Pte. Philip McRae. Mr. McRae was well known in and around Glencoe:—
Dear Miss McRae,—I am very sorry to write to you the sad news that Philip D. McRae, your father, was taken ill on our arrival in England with pneumonia and died in Bramshott Military Hospital last night. The weather here is wet and so much so that many of us have taken very bad colds—bronchitis, pneumonia, etc. I was to see him every day and he was quite bright and cheerful until yesterday morning when he took a sudden change for the worse. He will be buried with military honors in the churchyard cemetery at Liphook, about a mile and a half from here. Now I can simply add that we all in the hospital are very sorry for we all liked "Mac" as we called him. I am only voicing the feeling of all when I say that you have the sincerest sympathy of the whole battalion and the wish that the God into whose tender care he has passed may guard and keep you and yours till you all are reunited in His presence.

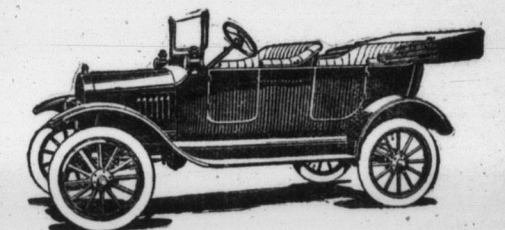
