

Londoners Will-Be Honored

Ottawa, Feb. 25 .- Canadian Press .- Total imports for consumption in Canada during the 12 months ending January, 1921, were \$1,305,-593,895, against a total importations valued at \$970,779,210 during the previous 12 months. Canada's total exports for the 12 months ending January, 1921, were \$1,263,221,401. This was a decrease of \$28,791,786 from the total exports of merchandise during the previous 12 months. The figures for the year ending January, 1920 were \$1,291,013,187, and for the 12 months ending January, 1919, \$1,269,318,344. Of the exports during the year ending January 1921, the exports of Canadian goods reached a total valuation of \$1,235,621,584. These showed a decrease of almost \$7,000,000 from the figures of the previous year, but the greatest decrease in the grand total of exports was in foreign goods, where there was a decrease of well over \$20,000,000.

Of goods imported in the period ending January, 1921, \$875,809,039 were dutiable and the amount of duty collected was \$195,008,401. Duty

free goods imported were value at \$429,783,956.

The United States led the countries in shipping goods to Canada. Our purchases there during the 13 months ending January, 1921, reaching the total value of \$898.984,675 against \$754,652,222. There was a striking increase in the purchases from Britain in the period just ended. Total imports from Britain were valued at \$226,248,605, against \$97,396,449 in the previous 12 months.

BRITISH SYSTEM OF TEACHING GEOGRAPHY AN EXCELLENT ONE

In Opinion of Public School Inspector V. K. Greer.

Regret that the British system of beginning the education of boys and girls in geography and map reading is not in use here, was expressed today by Public School Inspector V. K. Greer, when his attention was drawn by The Advertiser to remarks alleged to have been made in an address to the Hamilton Teachers' Institute yesterday by Professor G. A. Cornish. Toronto.

Professor Cornish is reported to have scored the present methods of teaching geography and the maps provided for that purpose which he said "it could be readily seen had been prepared by school teachers." He declared that ter times too many names are crowded on to the maps and that thereby details of the country which should be taught are covered over.

Inspector Greer agreed with Professor Cornish that there are altogether too many names on the maps used in the schools and referring directly to the construction of maps, he said, "it is a pity that the system of teaching map reading used in the British Isles is not in vogue here."

There, the first thing that a child learns about a map is that it does not represent, as it appears to do, a flat surface, but a convex surface, the outside face of an arc or section of a round body, the globe or earth. By this method the child when looking at a map realizes that it is looking at a distorted presentation of the surface of the earth, and that it cannot use the same scala presentation of the surface of the earth, and that it cannot use the same scale to measure the distance from Halifax, N.
