

AUSTRALIA MAKES NO SOLDIER GRANTS BUT RENDERS AID

EMPLOYMENT AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING ARE STRESSED

TORONTO, Ont., June 24.—Provincial Secretary Turley of the Great War Veterans' Association, has received a cable from the Australian government in reply to a cable sent by him asking if it is true, as contended by supporters of the resolution of the Calgary G. W. V. Association of \$2000 gratuity to Canadian soldiers, that Australian government is paying cash gratuity to returned men. He learns that Australia pays no cash gratuity. The able states that instead of a gratuity, each returned man is given stated employment insurance, varying from 2 pounds 2 shillings and upwards...

MANY PERSONS OF ALIEN BIRTH ARE ASKING PASSPORTS

EXACT NUMBERS ARE NOT AVAILABLE

(Special to The Record) OTTAWA, June 24.—Many applications for passports are being received from people of alien origin in the Dominion by the passport branch of the department of external affairs. These applications include not only enemy aliens to whom passports are refused but many from countries friendly to or which have been fighting with the allies during the war. In the case of such latter classes, passports are only granted if they have been naturalized in the Dominion. Those who are not naturalized are referred to their particular consular agent.

CONCERNING HOT WEATHER

During a conversation, Mr. & Mrs. Martin, caretaker of the Library, expressed an opinion on the heat experienced during June and the kind that may follow: "What kind of weather do you expect during July and August?" Mr. Martin: "I think the worst is over and that we may have a cool summer." "So you look at it from the standpoint that if we get unusually hot weather in June, the following month will be cooler?" "Yes. In our country there seems to be so much heat and so much cold to take. We have a good share of hot weather."

CERTAIN PENSIONS TO BE INCREASED

44,000 PERSONS ON CANADA'S PENSION LIST

OTTAWA, June 24.—Hon. N. W. Rowell's committee on soldiers and sailors pensions has recommended various increases and bonuses to disabled soldiers and relations of deceased soldiers. Two thousand persons will be affected by these increases, which will amount to half a million dollars per annum.

WILL BE PROVINCIAL COUNTY ROAD

Warden Panabaker caused some enthusiasm at the county council session this morning when he said that in an interview with the Minister of Public Works at Toronto he had been informed that the road from the Wentworth county line to the northern boundary of Waterloo county through this city, Waterloo and Elmira had been favorably considered and that the department had decided to take it over as a provincial county road. He was further informed that the application for a provincial county road from Guelph to meet the Waterloo-Wentworth road was being considered by the department but that it would be taken over as a provincial county road.

THURSDAY NEXT TREATY MAY BE SIGNED AT PARIS

CLEMENCEAU TO RESIGN OFFICE AFTERWARDS

PARIS, June 24.—Premier Clemenceau has expressed his intention to resign from office as soon as the treaty is promulgated, feeling that he has accomplished the task for which he assumed the premiership, says Meroel Hutin in the Echo de Paris. It is expected that the French Parliament will ratify the treaty late in July.

GERMAN PLINIPTENTIARY HAS RESIGNED

NEW YORK, June 24.—The Associated Press this morning issued the following statement: The signing of the peace treaty with Germany will probably take place on Thursday. There is some doubt about the date as yet, however, because of the lack of word from Germany regarding her new representation at Versailles. Dr. Daniel von Heimhausen, who was named as plenipotentiary to sign the treaty, has telegraphed his resignation to Weimar.

HERMAN MUELLER HEADS GERMAN DELEGATION PARIS, June 24.—Hermann Mueller, the new German Foreign Secretary, will head the German delegation to sign the peace treaty, so La Liberté says. The German delegates will probably arrive at Versailles on Wednesday morning.

NEW TEACHERS RECOMMENDED

The teachers' committee of the public school board held a meeting last evening when some recommendations were decided on urging some changes in the staff. Five positions are involved. The committee recommends new teachers for the same.

NEW MOTOR SPEED ACT HAS NOW GONE INTO EFFECT

OTHER IMPORTANT LEGISLATION HAS ALSO PASSED (Special to The Record) TORONTO, June 24.—The majority of the legislation enacted by the Ontario house, during the last session, becomes effective to-day. Royal assent to the legislation of the session was given on the day of prorogation, April 24, and a period of two months is named by statute in which all such measures come into force, unless specification is made to the contrary. Amendments to the motor laws are among those which take effect to-day. Under the new law, the speed limit in cities, towns and villages is raised from 15 to 20 miles an hour and the limit for country roads from 20 to 25 miles. At corners where traffic intersections, however, limits of 10 and 12 miles are fixed. Among other important measures are those which give women the right to sit in the legislature and to hold municipal office; that which makes playing of the national anthem at a close of every performance in a theater compulsory; and an act providing higher pensions under the Workmen's Compensation Act. The bill providing for school attendance on the part of adolescents between the ages of 14 and 18, does not become compulsory until a date to be fixed by order in council.
