One Hundred Years.

The Hon. Samuel Chipman celebrated his hundredth birthday on Saturday last at his home in Church St., Cornwallis. Over two hundred persons attended the reception held to commemorate the event and tendered congratulations in person, and a large number of letters and telegrams were received from friends residing at a distance.

No Imprisonment for Debt.

On the first day of May, 1891, there will come into operation in this Province a law entitled "An act relating to imprisonment for debt," which provides that no person shall be arrested or imprisoned under execution upon any judgment or order obtained in the supreme, county, probate, municipal, civil, or magistrates' courts, or in the courts of this Province, for the recovery of any debt or damage, without a special order therefor.

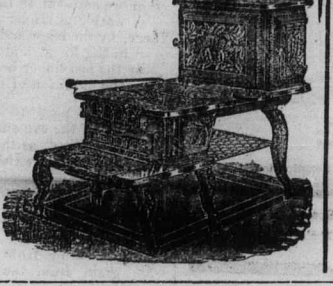
