THE RIVAL GRAND STOCK MARKET **FALLS COMPANIES**

Representatives of Companies Dominion Coal Showed Im-Declare That Each is Prepared to Rush Development at Once.

The Provincial Government yesterday afternoon heard the presentation of the cases of the rival interests seeking permanent control of the Grand Falls water power, with a view to harnessing it for commercial purposes. Mr. H. A. Powell, K. C., as counsel, and Mr. C. F. Sanford, of Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford, St. John, as attorney, and Mr. McCrae, expert engineer of Ottawa. and Messrs. Harry McLaughhli and A. L. Shaw, of New York, appeared on behalf of the Grand Falls Water Power Co. This is the last company incorporated, and in 1995 upon depositing \$50-000 as a proof of their bonafide intentions as an enterprise secured the lease of the water power privileges, and in 1907 this lease was amended. Mr. H. H. McLean, M. P., and Mr. F. R. Taylor appeared for the old company, which was formed by Sir William Van Horne, of the C. P. R., and the late Senator Proctor, of Vermont, with other interests. This company had charter rights which expired before anything in the line of definite development work had been done, and the other company then came in and upon putting up a deposit of \$50,000 were granted the rights by the late Government in 1995.
