Council of Norfolk. B., 8 Dec. 1848, at Stirling, Co. of Hastings. Self educated. Unmarried. Has been Reeve of the Township of Walsingham for several years. Has taken an active part in military matters, having had command of No. 3 Co. 39th Batt. of the Rifles for a period of 11 years. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Walsingham Centre, Ont.

MORRIS, Hon. ALEXANDER, D.C.L., Q.C., P.C. (Toronto East.)

Eldest s. of the late Hon. Wm. Morris, who was a mem. of the Leg. Assem. and Council of U.C., and of the L. C. of Canada continuously from the year 1820 until 1859, a period of 39 years. B. at Perth, Ont., 17 March 1826. Ed. at the Universities of Glasgow, Scot., and McGill Coll., Montreal. M., Nov. 1851, Margaret, dau. of William Cline, Esq., of Cornwall, Ont. Called to the Bar of U.C. in Hilary Term, 1851, and afterwards, in July, same year, to L.C. Bar. Called to the Manitoba Bar, Oct. 1872. Apptd. a Q.C. by the Govt. of Ont. 13 March 1876, and by the Dom. Govt., 13 Aug. 1881. Has been Presdt. of the St. Andrew's Soc., Montreal; a Governor of the Univ. of McGill Coll., and is a Trustee of the Univ. of Queen's Coll., Kingston. Is Vice-Presdt. North Am. Life Insur. Co., and a dir. of the Toronto General Trusts Co. Author of Canada and Her Resources, an essay, to which was awarded, by Sir E. W. Head, then Governor General, on a reference from the Paris Exhibition Committee of Canada, in consequence of a division of opinion in the Committee, the second prize; Nova Britannia, a lecture on the extent, resources and future of B.N.A., published 1858, at the request of the Mercantile Library Asso. of Montreal, in which he advocated the incorporation of the B.N.A. Provinces under one Confederation; The Hudson's Bay and Pacific Territories, a lecture, in which he also urged the incorporation of the North-West and British Columbia under one Confederation with the older Provinces of Canada and Acadia, and the construction of the Intercolonial and Pacific Railways; and of The Treaties of Canada with the Indians of the North-West, 1880.
