George Harrison and Friends - Live at Maple Leaf Gardens, Dec. 6

All the reviews I've read about this concert and tour say in one way or another "Beatles are Dead." So what else is new?

Harrison's main problem is his singing. His voice is getting worse all the time. At the concert he was hoarse and this prevented him from singing on key. It was pathetic. His new album sounds the same way.

His back-up band, consisting of many fine players – Billy Preston, Tom Scott, Jim Keltner, Willie Weeks, Robben Ford, Andy Newmark, Emil Richards, Jim Horn and Chuck Findley — lent great moral and musical support at the concert.

Harrison plays great guitar and his solos were short and tasty. But the fans hear their memories perfectly. George

tried, I have to give him that, and he was congenial as hell, but it was a dull, dull concert.

Billy Preston managed to get the crowd going on his solo trips, but three songs does not a concert make. The Shankar Family, minus Ravi, proved to be far more interesting than anything else, their music taking on a Western influence. They were the musical highlight of the show for me, and normally I can't stand that type of music.

In all, it was not disappointing because Harrison didn't rekindle the flames of Beatlemania; that's horsemanure. It was disappointing because Harrison is sick and simply didn't deliver.




