Lip Salve. A delicious lip salve that can be used during the day is made of one ounce of spermaceti ointment, fifteen grains of alsam of Peru, fifteen grains of alkanet rot and five drops of oil of cloves Let the alkanet stand in the cintment over a gentle heat until the liquid is deep rose colored, then put through a strainer. When cooled stir in the balsam and let all settle. When it is clear pour off, leaving the sediment at the bottom, and to the clear add the oil of cloves. When cold it will be hard.

AERIAL BATTLESHIPS.

Airship Will Do. Suppose that I consider it quite pos-

sible to visit the North Pole in an air "Suppose I predict that, at no distant date, aerial cruisers will threaten fleets,

date, aerial cruisers will threaten fleets, make war on submarine boats, and stampede army divisions?

"Suppose I tell you that I hope, as early as the coming summer, to give something to the impetus remaining needful to the aerial effort that will bring such things to pass in Europe?"

In these remarkable words, M Santos-Dumont begins, in the March number of the "Fortnightly Review," an article on the future of airships, which takes a strange and even thrilling grip of the imagination.

The twin enemies of ballooning are condensation and dilation. They have hitherto made is impossible for a balloon to stay much longer than twenty-four hours in the air. The world's record is thirty-six hours.

If a cloud masks the sun the gas in the balloon cools and condenses, and ballast has to be thrown out. The cloud vanishes, the balloon dilates under the heat and gas has to be release. der the heat, and gas has to be releas-ed. Thus the time soon comes when the balloon ceases to be able to carry its

The Problem Solved.

The twin enemies Santos-Dumont has vanquished.

How is it done? When the gas is condensed he re-heats it by means of steam. He carles, let us say, 24 lbs. of water. With one killogramme (2.1-5 lbs.) of netroleum he turns this into

of water. With one kilogramme (21-5 lbs.) of petroleum he turns this into steam, which dilates the gas to such an extent as to produce 36 lbs. of new ascensional force.

This steam does its work through the medium of alupinum tubes inside the balloon. It cannot mingle with the gas which it re-heats and it cannot injure the fabric of the balloon envelope.

Jure the fabric of the balloon envelope. And when the steam has done its work its comes out of the other end of the tube in the form of water. There is your 24 lbs. of ballast back again.

"The twenty kilogrammes (or more) of water remain always in a part of the original weighing of the balloon," says M. Santos-Dumont, "yet each time I send it round the circle at the cost of one kilogramme of petroleum I gain temporarily thirty kilogrammes of astemporarily thirty kilogrammes of as-

temporarily thirty kilogrammes of as-censional force.

"If the ordinary spherical balloonist can stay twenty-four hours in the air with a small quantity of sand ballast, I shall be able to slay thirty days in the air with the same quantity of petroleum ballast." New Airship.
