

ST. GEORGE.

A thriving village, situated on lot No. 6, third concession, township of South Dumfries, nine miles from Brantford ten from Galt, eight from Paris, and three from Harrisburgh station. It was settled in 1829 by Peter Bouslaugh, and the post-office was established in 1835; George Stanton, first P. M. The village contains three churches—Presbyterian, Rev. Robert Hume; Wesleyan Methodist, Rev. Thos. S. Keough, and Baptist, Rev. Joel Reddick; and two schools, averaging 130 pupils. The business consists of two grist mills, flax mill, foundry, cheese factory, three general stores, and waggon, blacksmith, cabinet and harness shops. The village is beautifully situated in the midst of a highly cultivated and fertile country, and is justly celebrated for the purity and excellence of its water, Mill Creek, which flows through it, affords ample power for its manufacturing establishments. In the summer of 1866, a company was formed for operating in digging for oil, but the attempt has been for a time abandoned.

Daily mails. Population, about 500.
