Memphis, Tenn., July 28.—There were three new cases this morning and no deaths. It has been raining steadily since daylight.

Two deaths from yellow fever occurred, one, however, beyond the city limits. The special policemen who were engaged taking the census of the city completed their task to-day. Memphis, Tenn., July 28.—The "Telegraph" says that every one who leaves the city is doing so, and trains for the north are crowded to their utmost capacity. Yellow fever has broken out in the same neighborhood where it began last year, the Golden District. From this district, a densely populated one, the fever originated in 1853, 1856 and 1875.

Memphis, July 29.—Six new cases of fever were reported this morning. Col. Cameron, with a detachment of colored soldiers, took quiet possession of the grounds selected for the camp, and by six this morning had 125 men set up tents. All mail matter leaving the city is thoroughly disinfected, and another remains uninfected.

Garrison, Tenn., July 29.—A special train from Fort Davis says Major Courtney skirmished with Indians at Salt Lake, 750 miles west of there. Saturday, Two soldiers were badly wounded and ten horses were captured from the Indians.

St. Paul, Minn., July 29.—John Kranz, of East Farmington, Wis., drove into the lake with six children in a wagon to water his horse. The horses becoming frightened ran into deep water. The wagon was upset and Kranz and five children were drowned. One boy escaped by swimming. The eldest child was a girl of seventeen.
