## General Intelligence.

### Eastern Europe.

We have only space to give the following items, received by the R. M. Stearns.

The Eastern-European question remains yet unsettled. An ultimatum from the great European powers has been sent from Vienna to St. Petersburg, the reply to which had not been received, and would not be for some days. The Czar has issued a decree forbidding the Hospitars to pay tribute to the Porte, or to hold any communication whatever with Constantinople.

At Constantinople this intelligence had raised the greatest indignation, and it was felt that the question of peace or war must be solved promptly, if it is to be solved in favour of peace. The Turkish Government has commended the Hospitars to repair without delay to Constantinople. This no doubt, they will do, unless held prisoner by Russia. If the Hospitars quit Jassy and Bessarabia the European Consuls will at once strike their flags, as they cannot recognize the illegal government of Russia.

Letters of the 18th from Constantinople, and of the 20th from the Lower Danube, state that the Egyptian fleet, with 12,000 men on board, is in quarantine at Sidi Barrani, not far from the Turkish coast. On the 15th a Russian war vessel, with four large gun boats, arrived off Sidi Barrani.

A letter from Vienna of July 26, in the "Cologne Gazette," says:— "General Prince Gortschakoff, commander-in-chief of the Russian troops in the Principalities, has declared, in a letter addressed to the British Consul, that messages shall be promptly accepted to clear the passage of the Salina, the Emperor of Russia, as he declares, not wishing the commerce of the Principalities to undergo any interruption.

The Greek churches in Albania and Macedonia have recently received important presents from the Czar.

St. Petersburg, July 25.—The Czar has ordered a fresh levy of recruits of 21,000 throughout the Eastern part of the Empire for the army and navy. The Jews are to give two recruits per 1000. The levy is to commence on the 1st of November.

### LATEST TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Orders have been sent from Constantinople to the Hospitars of Moldavia and Wallachia, commanding them to quit the Principalities, and retire to the right bank of the Danube.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 25.—A great meeting of the Turkish Council has been held. Another special messenger has been sent to Vienna. The Ambassadors of the Great Powers agreed to accept the proposals of Russia with certain modifications. The public feeling was calmer. Armaments continue. Troops were advancing towards Shumla. The Prophet's standard had been unfurled. Exchange on London, 118 to 118 1/2.

It is said that only 6000 Russians will remain in Moldavia. The bulk of the army will take up quarters in Wallachia by express order of the Czar. The trillone due to Turkey is to be placed at his disposal.

ODESSA, July 17.—The Grand Duke Constantine has just arrived in this city. He is named Grand Admiral of the fleet, and he proposed to proceed to Sebastopol to inspect the two squadrons of the Black Sea.

St. Petersburg, July 27th.—Letters are remarkably pacific in their tone, the Turkish question being treated as if it were virtually settled.

### New Brunswick.

RAILWAY AFFAIRS.—William Jackson, Esq., M. P., accompanied by his wife and Mr. Thomas Jackson, Esq., Robert Stephenson, Esq., M. John Ross, from Canada, Mr. Bidder, Superintendent of the Grand Trunk Railway, Mr. Koney, Secretary, and Mr. A. M. Ross, Chief Engineer.—On Friday last, the European and North American Railway Company in Maine, was organized, upon special session, Messrs. Jackson and Betts on behalf of the firm, offered to construct and equip the line through Maine, upon the Company undertaking to raise twenty per cent, of the necessary surveys, which are now in actual progress.

Mr. Stephenson will arrange the plans for the Tularik Bridges required for the Grand Trunk Railway across the St. Lawrence at Montreal, and for the European and North American Railway across the St. John at the Falls, near this city, and will remain at least a month on this side of the Atlantic. Messrs. Betts and Jackson will probably remain considerably longer, occupied with the details of the summer works they have undertaken for the Hon. John Ross.

Among other matters, the gentlemen above named will examine the capabilities of Portland Harbour, as a steamship terminus.—St. John Globe.

Boards are rather more inactive, owing to the difficulty of finishing vessels, and several parties of boards have been placed at 21s, which buyers look for a further reduction as the season advances.

Freights are high and scarce, and decidedly advancing. 40s. has been given for Liverpool, and 42s. 6d. may be considered the rate for London and the Out-ports. £6 10s. for Deals has been given to London.

The operations of war has not had any effect on prices, although there is a tendency to advance, it would doubtless be immediately felt in most articles of our exports.—*Foreign & Bell's Prices Current.*

### Newfoundland.

By the Steamer *Orphey*, which arrived at this port on Monday, 27th inst., we have received our usual intelligence. We give the following items of intelligence:—

By an arrival from the French Shore we learn that the fishery has been good this season in that quarter. The intelligence is also brought of a Newport vessel, iron laden, and bound for Quebec, having foundered on the Banks. The crew and passengers, three of the latter being females, and one of whom died, took to the boats, and after great privations for nine days, being reduced to the greatest extremities from want of food, they were picked up by a French vessel and carried into St. Antonio, whence they were taken by the colonial cruiser, under the command of M. H. Warren, Esq., to Lance au Loup, to procure a passage to Canada.—*Morn Post.*

Intelligence of the fisheries of Labrador has been received since our last. From Indian, Eskimo, Beothic and Dominio, the accounts speak of a very good catch, while from other parts of Labrador the reports, we regret to say, are exceedingly unfavourable.—*Nflder.*

Extract of a letter lately received from Bonaville:—"Squid are now plenty; fishing somewhat better. Mr. Perry's boat of Bonaville, has just returned from Round Harbour, Greenbay, with a good crop of fish. Reports that fish have lately struck in pretty plenty. A great number of Bonaville Bay people have left for Labrador."—*Courier, Gd.*

By a letter from Green Bay, dated 17th current, we learn that the British fishery has been very successfully conducted in the vicinity of Cape Bonaville, and that the fishery is now in full operation, and is catching up to date averaging between 50 and 60 tons per week. On the French shore, on the contrary, it has been unusually unproductive, the catch at Le Soc being only at the rate of 15 quintals per week.

We are in hopes of hearing soon of Mr. Warren's successful exertions in preventing encroachments at Belle Isle and Labrador, and as a consequence, of an increased demand and advanced prices for the produce of the Newfoundland fisheries that fall and the coming winter.

A late intelligence from the Westward is rather more favourable as to the catch than that previously received.—*Express.*
