The Rev. T. A. P. Hackett, D.D., Chancellor of Limerick Cathedr I, and Canon of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, has been appointed Archdeacon of Limerick. Dr Hackett was for some time Principal of the Diocesan Theological College at

A novel method has been found of augmenting the restoration fund for Winchester Cathedral. Ink-stands, paper-knives, match-boxes, letterweights, picture-frames, and other "curios" have been made from the oak of the foundations, which is 700 years old, and from that of the roof, whose age is about 810 years. The date and the facsimile of Dean Furneaux's signature appear on each, and they are sold to visitors outside the west door of the cathedral.

The Home Government have come to a provisional arrangement with the Marconi Wireless Company for the erection throughout the Empire of wireless stations which shall be able to communicate with each other at a distance of 2,000 miles or more. Six stations are to be erected at first. One will be put up in England, probably the next two will be located respectively in Egypt and British East Africa, there will be another in India, another at Singapore, another in South Africa, and the Australian Government will elect one for themselves in their own Dominion. The cost in round figures for a station, excluding sites and buildings, will be £60,000.

St. Luke's Church, Baltimore, is the principal legatee under the will of Mr. George L. Herbert, who was for many years a devoted member of the congregation, and who died lately. All articles of gold belonging to Mr. Herbert, consisting of necklaces, bracelets, chains, rings and other jewelry are bequeathed for the purpose of making a gold chalice and paten as a memorial to his wife and daughter, under the direction of the rector of the church. The residue of the estate is to be used to complete the tower of St. Luke's, as a further memorial to Mr. Herbert's wife and daughter. If the legacy is more than sufficient for the purpose, the balance is to be used for the maintenance of daily morning and evening prayer. It is estimated that to complete the church tower will require a sum of \$10,000.

To facilitate the proposed tripartite division of the Diocese of Oxford the Bishop of Oxford (Dr. Gore) announces that he is ready to relinquish £2,000 a year of his present income of

£5,000 towards the endowment of two new sees, one of Buckinghamshire and the other for Berkshire, which are now included in the Diocese of Oxford.

Sir William Forwood, on behalf of the Liverpool Cathedral Committee, has announced that it is their ambition to complete the first part of the cathedral within the next four years. During the past ten years the committee have collected £327,827, and have had special offerings for fitting, furnishing, etc., valued at £75,355. The completion of the lady chapel, choir, vestries, and chapter house will exhaust the funds. The cost of the nearest choir transepts will be £7 000, and to enable them to be consecrated with the choir the money must be obtained before the close of this


