On motion of Mr. Weldon.—The House, in Committee of the whole, went into consideration of a Bill to prevent Pedlars travelling and selling within this Province without Licence.

Mr. Ward in the Chair of the Committee.

The Chairman reported, that they had agreed to the Bill, with amendments. Ordered, that the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed, as amended.

Mr. Campbell, from the Committee appointed to search the Journals of the Honorable the Legislative Council, to ascertain what proceedings had been had upon a Bili in amendment of the several Acts for establishing Grammar Schools, having attended to that duty, reported, they found the following entry:-

" Council Chamber, 22d January, 1829.

PRESENT.

Mr. BAILLIE, The CHIEF JUSTICE, Mr. Justice Bliss, Mr. Hurd, Mr. Peters, Mr. BLACK, Mr. Justice Botsford, Mr. Robinson.

"Read a second time, a Bill in amendment of the several Acts for establishing Grammar Schools.

"On motion resolved, (Judge Bliss dissenting,) that the further consideration of this Bill be put off for three months."

On motion of Mr. Weldon.—The House in Committee of the whole, went into further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Partelow in the Chair of the Committee.

The Chairman reported, they had made progress in the business referred to them, and that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, that the Report be accepted and leave granted.

A Message from His Majesty's Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to "A Bill to regulate the exportation of Lumber, and to repeal all the Acts now in force relating to the same, with amendments, to which they request the concurrence of this House.

"And that the Council had passed a Bill to ascertain all ungranted Lands in the Township of Sackville in the County of Westmorland, and to vest all the vacant and unlocated wilderness Lots within the same, in the Crown.

To which they likewise request the concurrence of the House.

And further that the Council had agreed to "A Bill further to continue and amend the several Acts for raising a Revenue in this Province."

And that he was directed to communicate to the House that the Council had pass-

ed the following Resolution.

"Resolved, that the Council have observed, that by this Bill, sundry articles are " made subject to duty which have not been previously submitted to their considera-"tion, which the Council consider as a measure highly dangerous and unconstitution-" al, and a departure from the mode which has been adopted and acted upon for many " years by the two Houses.

"The Council however have concurred in the present Bill, but hope this concur-

" rence will not in future be drawn into a precedent."

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Partelow resumed the Chair of the Committee.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee, having gone into consideration of the

business referred to them, they had passed the following Resolutions:—
Resolved, that there be granted to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander-in-Chief for the time being, the sum of ninety-four pounds nine shillings and one penny, for the purpose of reimbursing John Wilson, Esquire, of Saint Andrews, for that sum advanced by him to open and improve the new route, from Mowat's Hill, so called, to Chamcook, now adopted as part of the Great Road from St. John St. Andrews, to be taken out of the sum to be appropriated for that road.
