Rev. T. Dobson returned last night from a few days' visit in Windsor, where he preached on Sunday.

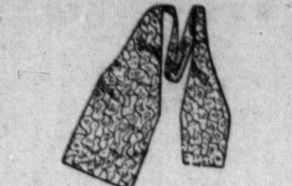
