OLD POSITIONS CONSISTING OF SHELL HOLES

"Impregnable" Positions Held by Germans Wrested From Them.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Rotterdam, via London, Aug. 25.—(New York Sun cable)—Karl Wegener, in the Koelnische Zeitung, describing the horrors to which the German troops are subjected on the Somme front by the French and British artillery, says that the Germans having been forced by the first sweep of the Somme offensive to give up their girdle of strongly built forts are now holding to a line of positions consisting only of a chain of shell holes.

"What is to be seen now," he writes, "is only that which we have been able to create in haste, under a fearful bombardment of both British and French. The men crouch in movable in these shell holes with no cover from sun or rain, and not the slightest protection against the shells dropping like a torrent from straight above."

"The men lie in these pits in the most fearful confusion with the wounded, and cannot be taken away until the approach of night, and with the dead who cannot be buried at all. In the August heat the bodies begin to decay quickly. Unceasingly the enemy strives to obtain the shells shrapnel and blows it up with heavy shells. When the attack begins, the terrors of these pits are beyond description. Like the fire rain upon Gommorah, the drum fire of the enemy comes down from heaven."

INSURANCE NOT TAXED.

Noted Passengers Land in New York

New York, Aug. 26.—The White Star Steamship Baltic arrived yesterday morning from Liverpool with 77 first, 54 second and 38 steerage passengers. Among the passengers were Arthur L. Sifton, J. E. Armstrong, M.P., and R. K. Bishop, Canadian officials, returning from the British Empire conference recently held at London. Also aboard were Dr. Ralph Grace of Canada, and H. Douglas Ivers returning from the front; Lucien S. Kirtland, a newspaper correspondent; Ernest T. Flisk, Marconi representative in Australia; Boris Said, a Russian, on a munition mission; A. B. Walton, who has been absent on a munition contract; Lady Jobs and Lady Walker.

OLD WORLD NOTES

The Scotch herring harvest is excellent, both in respect to catch and quantity. Submarines have no terror to the North Sea fishermen, and great fleets leaving each night from Aberdeen, Fraserburgh, Peterhead, and Stonehaven. Women have been known to accompany the men have as "look out" when the men have been hauling in the nets. "More Scotch herrings are arriving at Billingsgate than the public are consuming," says a well known fish merchant. "They are absolutely the cheapest food there is, for two weigh just a pound, and the public ought to get as many as they want at a penny each. Herrings are in the best condition now, and it would be a good thing, in these times of economy, if the public took to them more freely."

The rage for souvenirs of air raids is developing into a perfect craze in Scotland, in fact some men and women have been known to take great risks in order to obtain souvenirs of the Germans' many attempts to murder them. A few months ago a town on the east coast was raided, and immediately a number of people went out fishing for the bombs. They were fortunate, for on that occasion the bombs acted like damp earth with the true patriotism, and with an eye to the needs of the curious in posterity, they have presented the bombs to the Edinburgh City Council. The Council have ordered the souvenirs to be kept in the City Museum.

Scotland still leads in the consumption of "mountain dew." Mr. McKinnon Wood, the new Scottish secretary, states that the total quantity of spirits manufactured in England, Scotland and Ireland respectively during the year ending September 30, 1915, was: England, 12,083,285 proof gallons from eight distilleries; Scotland, 25,966,491 gallons from 113 distilleries; and Ireland, 9,610,631 gallons from 21 distilleries.

In several towns throughout Scotland impromptu movements have sprung up among young men, almost entirely unknown to the authorities, of military age, to prepare for a systematic training along lines laid down by the war office. Lads of 17 years of age are studying order books, pamphlets on formation, trench making, scouting and other conditions of successful modern warfare.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person before the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained in certain cases, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside at least 60 days in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-survey. Live stock may be established on cultivation under certain conditions.
