U. S. CUSTOMS COLLECTOR ARRESTED THE TREADGOLD COMMISSION WILL NOT ACT CUSTOMS MAN IN TROUBLE

W. J. Idleman United States Deputy Collector of Customs at Boundary on the Fortymile River Charged With Embezzlement of Public Money.

W. J. Idleman, deputy collector of American customs at the boundary, a point twenty-three miles up the Fortymile river from the town of the same name, is now an inmate of the jail at Eagle City, having been committed by United States Commissioner Samuel Graef on the charge of embezzlement. Idleman was taken to Eagle day before yesterday by Deputy U. S. Marshal Frank W. Clayton. News of the arrest and commitment was brought to Dawson by the steamer Tyrrell which arrived last night from Fortymile but the details are very meagre. One report says Idleman's shortage will amount to \$40,000, but as the business at this post would be necessarily small it is not generally believed the amount of the shortage can be nearly so great. It has been reported for some time that Idleman was to be removed or succeeded at the boundary by another man but no hints of crooked work were ever dropped and the news of his arrest on so serious a charge is a shock to those who know him or who have met him in a business way. Idleman was an appointee of former collector of customs for the District of Alaska John W. Ivy and, like nearly all of Ivy's deputies, was from Portland, Oregon, Ivy's former home. Ivy, being himself a Cornishman, was partial to people from Cornwall and nearly his entire force of deputies were originally from that place, although it is not known that Idleman

was. He has been at the boundary for upwards of two years and has always been one of the most popular of officials, being at all times polite, obliging and gentlemanly. His office and residence was a little cabin at the international line 23 miles up the Fortymile river in what is described as one of the most quiet and lonely places in the entire country, there being no other habitation in the same locality. Idleman is a bachelor about 45 years of age. He will probably be held at Eagle, unless able to provide bonds, until the next session of the district court.

The Second avenue people explain their non-appearance at the council chamber promptly at four as due to the fact that it was raining hard at that hour and that when they arrived at 4:15 the mayor and members of the council had departed. Another meeting will probably be arranged.

TREADGOLD IN THE HOUSE

Vigorous Language Used in the House in Connection With the Appointment of a Commission—Casgrain Talks of Reports Current in Ottawa.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Ottawa, June 4.—Animated discussion occurred in the house of commons yesterday on the Treadgold concession commission. Casgrain roundly scored the government for the manner in which they had dealt with the subject. He said that Mr. Ross had made specific promises to his constituents for the fullest inquiry and yet the government had appointed violent partisans and Judge Britton to make the investigation. He was not repeating anything not current at Ottawa, when he declared that large sums of money had passed between the concessionaires and gentlemen in high authority. It was due to the government to wash their hands of the matter. Premier Laurier reproved Casgrain for taking stock of street rumors and said if he would formulate charges a parliamentary investigation would be granted. Monk declared that responsible men had stated that the Treadgold concession had only been obtained by the payment of money to persons occupying high controlling positions. Blair said the government did not propose that the commission should go beyond the inquiry as to whether the government's policy was against hydraulic mining. He believed that Judge Britton would not accept the commission. Hardman, of Montreal, had already declined.

ANOTHER STRIKE
