THE NEWSPAPER LAWS.

What Some of the Delinquent Subscribers Would Do Well to Read.

The laws in force regarding the receiving of newspapers, provided by Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are legally considered wishing to continue their subscriptions.

The latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can prosecute anyone for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. The man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid and then orders it discontinued lays himself liable to arrest and fine, the same as for theft.

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
