MR. BORDEN'S TOUR.

Gratifying in every respect has been the tour of Mr. R. L. Borden and his lieutenants through Manitoba, the Territories and British Columbia, points out the Guelph Herald. Everywhere they were received with enthusiasm, large crowds attended their meetings and there were not lacking practical demonstrations of the unity of the Conservative party on an all Canadian

In opposition they had a special policy for every section of the country. In power they quickly destroyed the Free Trade plank of the Ottawa platform and made protection the basic principle of their

tariff legislation. The west, through which Mr. Borden's journey was in the nature of a triumphal tour, has heartily accepted the re-affirmation of the National Policy from the Conservative leader. Thinking people realize that with the expansion of the agricultural resources of that great country industries will develop to supply the wants of the people and provide a valuable home market for the less staple products of the farm. Only by such a policy, a policy that considers Canada as a whole and keeps the interests of Canadians constantly in view can we hope to realize the great future which the varicty and extent of our natural resources and the progressiveness and stability of our people entitle us to believe is in store for this Domin-

SIGNIFICANCE OF MR. CHAMBER LAIN'S VISITS.

The announcement is officially made that the British Colonial Secretary, Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, with the ap proval of the King, has decided to visit South Africa about the end of the present month, to enquire into the problems incident to the closing of the war and the settlement of affairs in the new colonies, comments the Toronto News. It is hinted that this step will be the precursor of similar visits to Canada and Australia,

This announcement, we are told, has been received with the utmost surprise in political circles in England, but with the strong approval of public opinion. The decision of the Government that the Colonial Secretary, who is recognized as the strongest and most influential member of the Cabinet, should visit South Africa at the moment when the Government needs all its strength in safely piloting its Education Bill through Parliament, is a recognition of the ex-4reme gravity of the situation in the Cape and the newly acquired colonies, but it also indicates that, the awaken ing of interests in the Mother Country over the condition of affairs in her colonies. has made possible an inova tion in administrative methods which could not have been justified in the eyes of the public a few years ago. This fact is borne out by the suggestion, made from official sources, that Mr. Chamberlain's visit to South Africa will be followed later on by similar
