REVOLUTION

Stirs Russia by Government's Non-Redemption of Promises

GAVE VENT TO PASSIONS

St. Petersburg, May 28.—At the end of a memorable seven-hour session the Lower House of Parliament Saturday indignantly rejected the Government's policy as presented by Premier Goremykin, and with only seven dissentients, voted lack of confidence in the ministry, practically throwing down the gauntlet to the bureaucracy with a demand for retirement of the pressure a demand for retirement of the present Cabinet and its supercession by a ministry approved by the majority in the House.

Conflict Appears Inevitable.

The spirit of absolute revolution is in the air and a conflict between the crown and the nation now appears to

be inevitable. While the House avoided the appear While the House avoided the appearance of delivering an ultimatum, the Government seems to have no alternative except surrender or war. The gloomiest forebodings were every where expressed last night, and the general impression is that the country is on the verge of a titanic struggle, which may be delayed but not averted. Despatches received from the interior indicate that the struggle possibly may be inaugurated Monday with a general strike when the people learn that all amnesty has been refused them.

While the Premier's statement promised co-operation with the Lower House, "in so far as the latter does not transgress the limits of the fundamental laws," it recognized the agrainan question as paramount, proposing to remedy the deficiency in land through the operation of an agrarian bank and migration to Siberia. It proposed the introduction of universal and compulsory education, the reform of the administration and the realization of the four liberties. Premier Goremykin's statement, however, returned a nonpossumus on the burning Goremykin's statement, however, re-turned a nonpossumus on the burning question raised by the House in its reply to the speech from the throne. It declared that the Government's fiat and exceptional laws cannot be with-drawn until order and terrorism cease. drawn until order and terrorism cease. The expropriation of appanages of the crown and church and private lands was declared to be inadmissible. The right of investigation of administrative acts, the statement declared, belonged to the crown, the House having only the power of interpolation. Amnesty, Premier Goremykin said was solely the prerogative of the Emperor.

Free Range to Passions. Such, broadly, was the Government's reply to the address of the House, and the Premier's words seemed to arouse all the latent resentment in the hearts of the members of the House. The Constitutional Democratic leaders for the first time gave free range to their passions, and with flaming words ora tor ofter orator declared the Government's program inadmissible, and said that the ministry must give way to a ment's program inadmissible, and said that the ministry must give way to a Cabinet in which the people had confidence. M. Roditcheff announced that the Government's reply had dashed to the ground all the hopes of his hopes of working in harmony with the administration. M. Kovalesky enacted the role of Mirabeau, practically paraphrasing the Frenchman's words, "We are here by the will of the people, and nothing but bayonets can disperse us," while half a dozen peasant members hurled deflance at the ministry. Even Count Heyden, the leader of the right, de denance at the ministry. Even Count Heyden, the leader of the right, deserted the Government's side, saying that inasmuch as the Government had refused to redeem its promise to repeal the exceptional laws, his vote was for censure.

The resolution of censure as adopted provides that the House shall proceed.

The resolution of censure as adopted provides that the House shall proceed with the order of the day Monday, thus adroitly placing upon the shoulders of the Government the responsibility for making the next move. Ministry Hesitates.

It is as follows: "This declaration of the Premier, heard to-day by Parliament, contains the decisive declaration that the Government in no way wishes to meet the demands of the people, and the expectation of a land of liberty and civil ration of a land of liberty and civil rights, enumerated in the address of the House in reply to the speech from the throne, without fulfilment of which pacification of the country and successful work by the House is impossible. By its refusal to satisfy the popular demands, the Government clearly shows its disregard of the real-
