To the Editor of the ACADIAN:

Sir,—I noticed in your issue of April 8th, a report of the annual meeting of the trustees and lot holders of Willow Band Cemetery. It is to be regretted, as alluded to in the report, that so few attended this meeting and so little interest is taken by lot holders. It is now some twelve years since these grounds were handed over to the original trustees, and but very little progress as yet discernible since the first two or three years in the ornamentation and care thereof. It may be the lack of ornamentation and care on the part of those having the grounds in charge which causes so little interest to be taken on the part of lot holders, or it may be the unseemly hour at which this meeting was held. Many of the lot holders live at a considerable distance away, some as far as five miles, and it would be very inconvenient for them to attend a meeting at Wolfville at the hour of 8.30 o'clock, p. m., particularly when the roads are in such a condition as they usually are the first part of April. If the night of meeting cannot be changed, I think it would be desirable by all outside of the business men of the town to have the meeting at an earlier hour in the day. St. George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M.

There was an interesting time in St. George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., on Friday evening. The Lodge issued invitations to sister Lodges, and visitors were present from Kentville, Hantsport, Truro, Harmony Lodge and Booth Lodge, of Yarmouth. The installation of officers was the work of the evening. District D. G. Master G. H. Wallace conducted this ceremony, assisted by R. S. Masters, P. J. G. W. A. M. Hoare, G. master of C. D. Margeson, of Hantsport; Mr Porter of the same place, and the oldest P. M. of the lodge. The following are the officers: C. R. H. Starr, W. M.; Watson Duncan, S. W.; W. M. Pick, J. W.; H. C. The Lodge went from labor to refreshment to the Village hotel, and partook of the good things provided. There were about 40 present, among the number being Rev. Geo. Tuffs, of Maine, who stands high in the order; Prof. Shaw and Mr Murray.

St. George's Lodge is one hundred and eight years old, and the master masons of the lodge are entitled to wear a jewel. Some 14 of the members have already secured these, and the jewel, a St. George's cross, with well designed attachment, is a very elegant piece of workmanship.

The Lodge has preserved the old records of the work of its organization and the minutes are written in a good bold hand. There was a period when it was impossible for the lodge to meet, an interval of nearly 30 years, and yet a very remarkable thing occurred in that the same officers opened the lodge that closed it. There is much matter of interest to those interested in this subject in connection with this lodge which is worth touching upon and may be sent to the press later. It is worthy of note that the present Tyler has been installed into his office in this Lodge for the twenty-second time.
