Acadia Won Out.

BY A SCORE OF 4 TO 3 IN THE PLAY OFF WITH MOUNT ALLISON AT TRURO FRIDAY.

In one of the most keenly contested football matches ever witnessed in the Maritime provinces, Acadia College's fifteen defeated Mount Allison's team in the play off for the King-Richardson trophy at Truro last Friday.

The contest was a battle royal from start to finish, and was witnessed by over 2000, including a large number who came from Wolfville and Sackville by special trains.

In the second half both Richmond and Stults of Acadia were injured so seriously that they were obliged to be replaced by Morrison and Robinson. Acadia won the toss and Athias kicked, but the ball was returned by Buckley and the Allisocians quickly followed up and a scrum ensued. Buckley getting the ball made a short run, when he was tackled and passed the ball to Godfrey, who made a touch down, but they failed to convert. The ball was passed to the Allisocians' territory and the Acadians quickly followed up, but the ball was secured by Godfrey who made a nice run, but the ball was returned to their territory. The play was well in the Allisocians' territory when they secured a free kick on account of Acadia picking the ball out of the scrum. They quickly followed up and Acadia returned and a scrum ensued at Mount A.'s 25 yard line. The ball was got out of the scrum and passed to P. T. Andrews who, leaping over the Mt. A. fullback, placed the ball over the line amid the cheers of the spectators.

Reid failed to convert and Milford secured the ball and made a beautiful punt and his team mates quickly followed and kept the ball hovering around centre. The ball kept going back and forth until the finish of the half with the play in favor of Mount A.

Mount Allison kicked and kept the ball at the 25 yard line for a few minutes when Acadia also punted. The game was here delayed by P. T. Andrews being hurt, but he resumed play in a few minutes. The game was beginning to get rougher. The ball was being kept in Mount Allison's end when Richmond who was playing quarter for the Acadians was tackled and again his ankle, which kept him out of the previous game, compelled him to retire and his place was filled by Morrison. The ball was hovering between the 25 yard line and touch line and it looked as if Acadia would secure a touch when the ball was secured by Buckley who touched for safety. In a scrum Stults had his shoulder badly hurt and he had to retire and his place was filled by Robinson. Buckley secured the ball and with the aid of Durant was away for a good run, when the referee blew his whistle and he put Durant off for interference. Before the half closed, Dickenson, Reid and Lyons each received an injury, which delayed the game for a few minutes.

During this latter period Acadia twice forced Mt. A. to kick the ball over the dead ball line.

A New Brunswick Boy, Leader.
Bonar Law, a New Brunswick boy, now representing the Bootley district of Lunenburg, in the English House of Commons, has been chosen as Leader of the Unionist party in parliament, in place of Hon. A. J. Balfour, who resigned a week ago.

Mr. Law is the son of an Irish clergyman and was born at Richmond, N. B., in 1859, and is 52 years of age. His mother was a Miss Kidston, of Halifax. He was in business in Glasgow, Scotland, up till 1903 and acquired a moderate fortune. He has been in active political life the last eleven years. He has been in Richmond, N. B., and a member in Halifax. He is said to be a brilliant speaker and a reason-able debater.
