CHINA ACCEPTS JAPAN'S DEMAND

Arsenals and Dockyards of China
to Come Under Japan's Control.

Shanghai, April 27.—(By the
Associated Press.)—The statement
is made in the first issue of The
Shanghai Gazette, which has made
its appearance under the editorship
of Eugene Chen, that the Chinese
Government has agreed to new de-
mands made by Japan which are of
such a nature that the country has
virtually been turned over to the
Japanese. The Gazette asserts it
has been informed by a high offi-
cial at Peking that the Japanese de-
mands are far more serious than
those in Group V of the famous
twenty-one demands made by Japan
in 1915.

"Notwithstanding the fact that
the utmost secrecy is being ob-
served," says The Gazette, "it may be
stated safely that the following is
not far from the true terms of the
government:

"Chinese expeditionary forces sent
into Siberia shall be commanded by
a Japanese.

"The Chinese police shall be or-
ganized by Japanese officers.

"Japan shall control all of China's
arsenals and dockyards.

"Japan shall have the privilege
of working mines in all parts of
China.

"Special privileges shall be grant-
ed to Japan in outer and inner
Mongolia and the whole of Man-
churia.

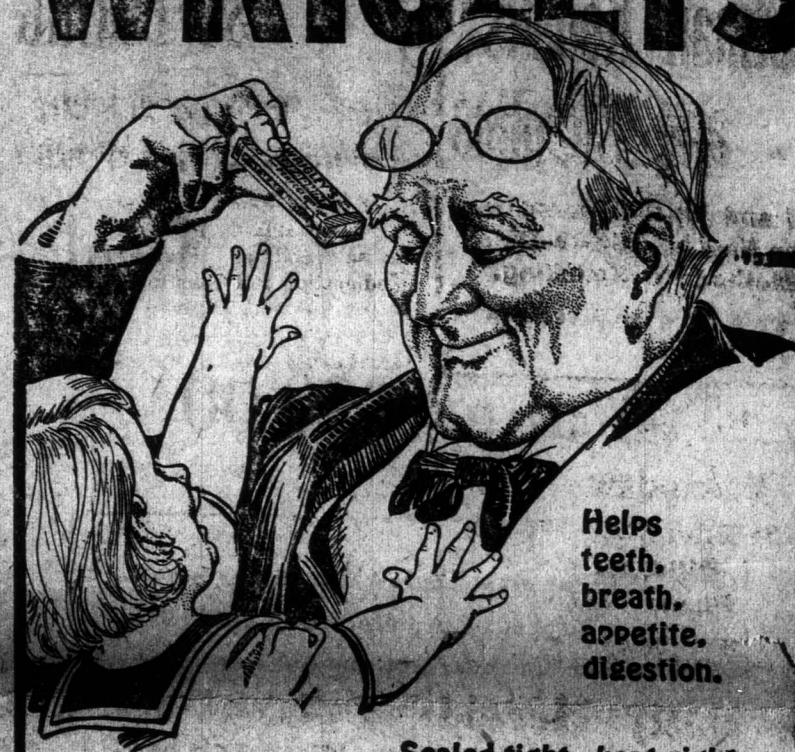
Other articles include provisions
for financial control and education-
al assistance."

SAMMIES HONORED BY THE FRENCH

With the American Army in
France, April 29.—(By Associated
Press.)—The French army today de-
corated 122 American soldiers of
a Massachusetts regiment with the
War Cross for bravery displayed in
recent fighting. The ceremony was
held on a picturesque field a short
distance from the first line of tran-
ches. One hundred and seventeen
men from the 104th Massachusetts
Regiment which bore the brunt of
the German attack in the Apremont
Forest on April 12, received medals.
As did five men of another regiment
who had participated in earlier fight-
ing around Solomons. Here and there
in the line were spaces representing
Americans who were killed or seri-
ously wounded. The French general
in conferring the decorations, said
of the regiment:

"It showed the greatest audacity
and a fine spirit of sacrifice. Sub-
jected to violent bombardments and
attacked by large German forces, it
succeeded in checking the dangerous
advance and took at the point of the
bayonet in a most vigorous way pri-
soners and some demolished trenches
from which it had fallen back at the
first assault."
