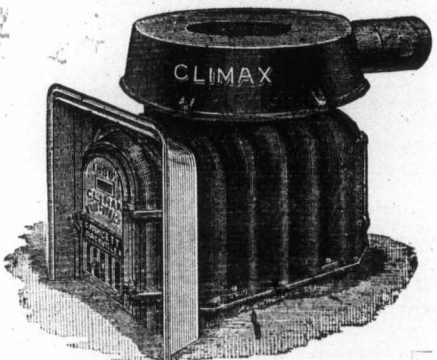

Burchill on Trial for His Life.

THE DETAILED STORY

On Friday the 21st of February this year, there was found the dead body of a young man on the shore of the town of Hillsboro, Ontario. He had evidently been there some days. He was found by a couple of farmers about 11 o'clock in the morning. The body was frozen and stiff and there were indications on the body and on the clothes of the fact that he had passed some time in the water. The body had been there some days.

It was evidently a murder. There was no question about that from the position of the body and the fact that a person could have committed suicide by firing one shot, from the wounds, such as found it would have been impossible to have repeated the shot or made the second wound. So it was a manifest murder by some one, and at first it seemed a mystery without anything to unravel. But on the following day the body was found with the name "F. C. Burchill" written upon it, and from that moment the case unveiled itself by step until the scene of the crime of March, when the officers thought that it was their duty to arrest the prisoner at that time and charge him the willful murder of the man so found.

The young man the victim of this murder, was a son of Lieut.-Col. Burchill, a retired army officer living in Cheltenham Gloucestershire, England. He was aged about 24 years. He was murdered on the first day he entered the Dominion. Burchill, the murderer of the man made, it appears, a business of using young Englishmen who desired to learn Canadian farming to come to his place, which by the way did not exist to learn to farm. Burchill answered the advertisement in an English paper and his father made an arrangement in a cash payment that Burchill should take his son as a pupil. Burchill came to Canada, and was numbered as above. The trial has shown a clear case of willful murder against Burchill and the jury returned a verdict in accordance with the facts. On Monday last he was sentenced to be hanged on November 14th. Burchill is very stoical regarding the matter. He maintained the utmost indifference during the trial and even when the sentence was passed he flinched but slightly.
