King Arion Marked a Mile
Here Yesterday in 2.16 3-4

Champion Trotting Stallion Has Made Rapid Recovery From Illness—Showed Last Half of Seventh Mile in 1.05 1-2—Pool Seller Ed. Morse Arrested

King Arion (2:17 3/4), the champion trotting stallion of the Maritime Provinces, has made a quick recovery from the illness which ruined his chances in the Woodstock races of getting a new and fast record. Yesterday he performed in a work out at the Fredericton Park Association's track in a manner which made the rail birds sit up and look.

It is a long time since there has been a more satisfactory workout by even a pacer over the local track and nothing of the kind was ever shown by a trotter here.

In all Driver Leonard worked seven heats. The first few heats were slow and the speed was gradually increased until the fifth mile was done in 2:16 3/4 with King Arion always going within himself. Then the work was gradually eased off until the final half of the seventh mile, which was trotted in 1:05 1/2, the time for the full mile being 2:25.

King Arion is staked in a \$1,000 race at Brockton Fair this fall, and he will likely have an extensive campaign before the snow flies, if he stays right.

The friends of Ald. Harry C. Jewett, the owner of King Arion, will be pleased to learn that his speedy black pacer mare, Daisy B., which got injured in the races here on June 30th, is rounding to nicely and showing so much speed that she will probably be started at the next meeting on the Maritime Circuit.

LANGFORD A SURE WINNER.

Billy Gibson Says Nova Scotian Can Whip Johnson in Less Than Five Rounds.

New York, July 13.—"If Sam Langford can ever drag Jack Johnson into a ring for a boxing match, he will whip the champion in less than five rounds. Johnson whipped practically

a dead man in Jeffries, and nobody knows this better than Johnson." Thus spoke Billy Gibson, one of the master matchmakers of the country and the moving spirit of the Fairmount Athletic Club.

Let Him Put Up Some Money, Says Johnson—Again Tells How Langford Can Get a Fight.

New York, July 13.—Jack Johnson says his fight with Jim Jeffries netted him \$168,000.

Referring to future matches in a statement made here, he said: "I will fight Langford as soon as he posts \$20,000, to go as a side bet, and a promoter can be found to offer a \$50,000 purse. I don't believe, however, that a match with Langford would draw. Reno is the only place left on the map where we could fight."

"I understand that Frank Gotch wants to fight me. Well, let Frank put up some money and I will take him on."

"I don't intend to fight for a long time, however, I think I'll draw the color line and take a good rest."
