MORE DECLARATION DAY PROCEEDINGS

Official Returns for Albert, Westmorland and Restigouche Are Available.

Moncton, June 26.—The results of the voting in Moncton city and Westmorland County were officially declared at the Restigouche today as follows:

Moncton City—Price, 1,384; Robinson, 812.

Westmorland County—Black, 3,550; Humphrey, 3,528; Mahoney, 3,501; Melanson, 3,436; Copp, 3,045; Magee, 2,992; Killiam, 2,976; Leger, 2,923.

The candidates all spoke briefly, with the exception of Messrs. Killiam and Leger, who were not present.

In Albert County.

Albert, June 26.—The sheriff resumed declaration proceedings here today, opening his court at 2 o'clock. The attendance was slim. George D. Prescott appearing in person, while Police Magistrate E. E. Peck represented W. B. Dickson. Neither of the opposition candidates all spoke briefly, with the exception of Messrs. Killiam and Leger, who were not present.

In Restigouche County.

Dalhousie, June 26.—Declaration day passed very quietly here. About a hundred gathered to hear the sheriff declare the state of the polls, which were as follows:

Culligan, 1,575; Stewart, 1,572; LaBillico, 1,021; McKenzie, 975.

Efforts to get the Senator to deny or affirm that he had conferred with Mr. Bryan or other leaders on the third party movement, or any other political subject were met with a consistent refusal to talk about it.

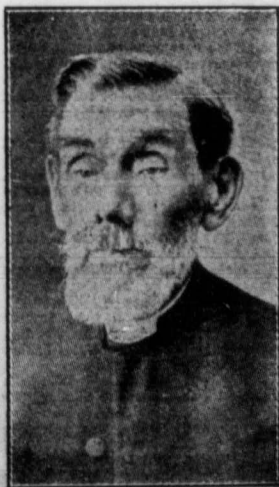

TWO DROWN WHEN VESSELS COLLIDE

400 Excursionists Had Narrow Escape on St. Croix When Dredge Got in Way.

St. Stephen, June 27.—A serious marine tragedy occurred on the St. Croix river five miles from Calais at midnight when the excursion steamer Grand Manan, with 400 passengers on board, collided with the American dredge of the Bay State Dredging Co. at work on the river, sending the latter to the bottom with her captain and perhaps one member of the crew. None of the passengers nor crew of the Grand Manan were drowned.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him, or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to secure homestead patent) and cultivate 20 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a quarter-section homestead in certain districts. Price, \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
