CANADIAN CLUB.

Speakers For Banquet Are All Arranged For.

W. M. McClelland, President of the Canadian Club, announces that the final arrangements have been made for all the speakers for the annual banquet to be held at the Royal Hotel on the evening of the 20th of February next. Dr. Falconer, President of the Toronto University, W. L. McKenzie King, Deputy Minister of Labor, Ottawa, and F. D. Monk, M. P. from the province of Quebec, will be the chief speakers of the evening. Presidents of Canadian Clubs of Ottawa, Toronto, Brantford and St. Catharines will also be invited. It is expected that this will be the largest banquet in the history of the club. Tickets will be issued in a day or so and members in particular should see to it that they procure their tickets within three or four days as there is a very large demand for them from citizens who are not members. The club expects to increase the membership by another hundred before the date of the banquet. Members will get precedence in the sale of tickets. Citizens who have not yet handed in their application for membership in the club should do so before the date of the banquet.

TEN MONTHS' REVENUE.

Increase at Rate of Million Dollars a Month.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—The financial statement of the Dominion for the month of January and for the first ten months of the current fiscal year shows an increase of \$84,337 in the total revenue for the last month, as compared with January, 1907, and an increase of \$9,374,342 for the ten months. The total expenditure on consolidated fund account for the ten months was \$56,332,334, an increase of \$10,650,229. Of this increase \$2,033,244 is chargeable to the January figures for payment of subsidy increases to the Provinces, amounting to \$1,500,000, and of interest charges on the public debt, totalling \$2,623,459, both falling due last month. For the ten months the surplus of revenue over expenditure on consolidated fund account amounted to \$24,091,738. The total expenditure on capital account, as entered on the books of the Finance Department up to January 31st, was \$22,245,499, of which \$17,446,975 was chargeable to Public Works, Railways and Canals. The National Transcontinental Railway is, of course, responsible for much of this amount.

The total net debt of the Dominion at the end of last month was \$259,504,615.
