## TEN MONTHS' REVENUE.

Increase at Rate of Million Dollars a Month.

a Month.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—The financial statement of the Bominion for the month of January and for the first ten months of the eurrent fiscal year shows an increase of \$84,337 in the total revenue for the last month, as compared with January, 1907, and an increase of \$9.374,542 for the ten months. The total expenditure on consolidated fund account for the ten months was \$66,332,534, an increase of \$10,650,229. Of this increase \$2,033,244 is chargeable to the January figures for payment of subsidy increases to the Provinces, amounting to \$1,500,000, and of interest charges on the public debt, totalling \$2,623,459, both falling due last month. For the ten months the surplus of revenue over expenditure on consolidate fund account amounted to \$24,691,738. The total expenditure on capital account, as entered on the books of the Finance Department up to January 3st, was \$22,245,499, of which \$17,449,75 was chargeable to Public Works, Railways and Canals. The National Transcontinental Railway is, of course, responsible for much of this amount.

The total, net debt of the Dominion at the end of last month was \$259,504, icl.
