

We congratulate the anti-Confederates of Nova Scotia on the results of last Wednesday's election. Lunenburg has acted nobly. Mr. Hobb, the member elect, is a liberal in politics, but a decided opponent of the Quebec Scheme. Mr. Swicker, the opposing candidate, professed the same political creed, and promised that he would not vote for Confederation until he saw his way clear, which means, until after he was elected. On nomination day, Dr. Tupper and Jonathan McCully, two of the most violent political opponents before the Delegation to Quebec, presented themselves to the electors of Lunenburg, whom they advised, coaxed, and entreated to vote for their nominees. Having found him in very suspicious company, the people very properly rejected Mr. Swicker. This is now the second partial election which has taken place in Nova Scotia since the accession of the Conservatives to power, and in each case the result has been the defeat of the Government, and the return of an anti-Confederate. In Nova Scotia the Quebec scheme is at a very heavy discount. Dr. Tupper and Jonathan McCully know this very well, and hence their anxiety to carry it during the coming session. They dread the thought of a general election. Hobb's majority in Lunenburg will add to their terror and dismay.—F.A.T.

**A STORY OF THE CRIMINALS.**—This is not a bad story of what happened to an English traveller in the Crimea. It is in French, and is told by M. Louis Noir. It appears that an Englishman was madly in love with a Scotch vivandiere at Balaklava, and bored her with his addresses. The young woman, no longer able to endure the annoyance, forbade him the door. After many a vain attempt to overrule her objections, the tourist determined to commit suicide, but, in presence of the great events which were being played out in no paltry manner. Having first bequeathed his fortune to the vivandiere, he caused a deep hole to be dug, in which he placed twenty pounds of powder, over this excavation a slab was laid, and upon it the rejected one, cigar in mouth, took his seat. He tranquilly finished his weed, which was no doubt a good one and not easily parted with, and then applied the expiring embers to the magazine below. "Explosion out here," and the heavens fell into the port—a mass which astonished British seamen recognized as a human body, and proceeded to fish from the water. There was a general cry of "A man from Heaven!" Some declared that he had been kicked out of the sea, others that he was an aeronaut come to grief. It proved to be the Englishman, who presently recovered his consciousness, and the vivandiere, touched by this proof of affection, capitulated. The blowing up is not so extraordinary as some may fancy, for, adds M. Louis Noir, Captain Fernier was blown up with his battery, and was found sitting 500 yards off, wondering what the devil had happened, and not in the least hurt.

**A MURDER NOTORIOUS.**—Among the "Hons" brought by the "Cuba" yesterday was John C. Heenan, the well known prize fighter. The "Bainin Boy" had a sort of informal levee, by becoming a gazing stock for scores of curious individuals who passed and repassed him, scanning with eyes more or less critical his celebrated "shoulder-hitting" instruments, his broad back and his "bread-basket," "toplights," "cleat mag" "daddies" and "priss." Heenan tried to look magnanimous as unconcerned as a reigning actor in an opera box. A somewhat awkward look, and an air suggestive generally of the "sere and yellow leaf" were the chief peculiarities of the noted bruiser.—H. C.

The schr. is to be off the 1st May, and the money for building and equipping her raised in shares of \$20 each. We wish the schooner every success, and hope the speculation may not end as did the "West India Company," some years ago, when next morning the shareholders could not believe their own signatures.—Com.
