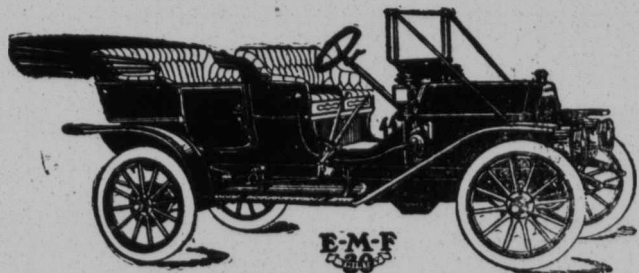

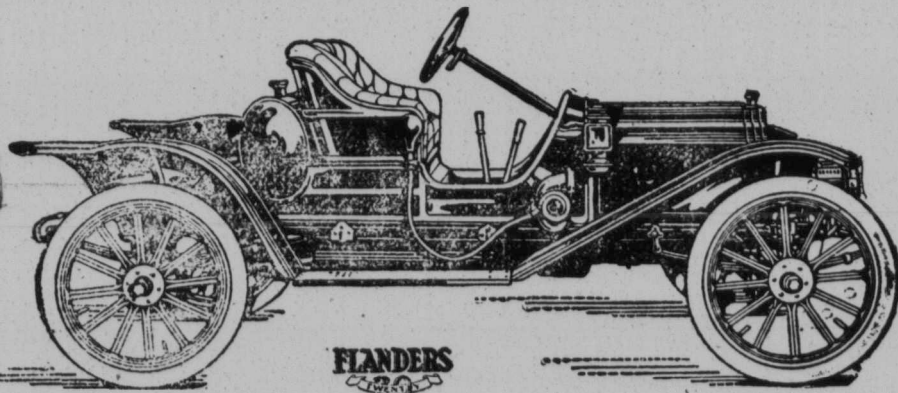

## POP GO 100,000 WEASELS

That Number Will be Wanted for Coronation Robes.

"No end of trappers," said a London fur store manager, "are on the war-path after ermine fur for the robes of royalty and nobility. The stout, or ermine weasel's skin, only measures a foot long by three inches wide, so about 100,000 weasels will be wanted for Coronation robes. The more biting the cold, where the animal is trapped, the whiter is the fur. And it is 'parks' in Siberia! During the last Coronation there was a weasel famine, and fine skins popped up to half-a-sovereign apiece. "Ermine fur is used either plain or 'powdered' on the cape of the robe. There the rows of little black dots indicate the degree of the wearer. "These dots, very carefully inserted at measured intervals are made from the fur of the blue-black seal, dyed black. "But, black or white, the seals are not having such a time of it just now as the weasels."

### CORONATION CLAIMS

An Interesting Dispute as to Who Shall Bear the Great Spurs.

It is expected that two millions of visitors will be attracted to London by the magnificent proceedings in connection with the coronation of King George and Queen Mary. To many the appeal made by those proceedings will be merely the appeal of the spectacular; they will be drawn to the coronation as they would be to a Durbar in India, or to the enthronement of a Czar and Czarina, which for gorgeousness and lavish splendor outvalues the greatest spectacles East and West. For many the coronation ceremonies in London will have a high patriotic and religious significance. To others they will appeal strongly on the historical and heraldic side, and these latter will be interested in the hundreds of cases which are being considered by the Court of Claims—cases of hereditary claims to do certain things, or occupy certain places at the coronation proceedings. The case which is attracting the greatest amount of attention, as it is giving the Court of Claims the greatest amount of trouble, is the three-cornered one between Lord Grey de Ruthyn, the Earl of London, and Lord Hastings, to bear the Great Spurs at the ceremony. Each of the three can claim descent from the baron who carried the Great Spurs at the coronation of Richard II. The suggestion that the matter might be settled by the Court of Claims ordering a three-handled silver dish to be made, in which the Great Spurs should be carried, each of the three claimants holding a handle of the dish, would be regarded, of course, as a little short of sacrilege by the upholders of the sacredness of all these fine points of ancient quaintness and historic ceremonial, which are reminders of the acts of personal service to the sovereign, upon which estates and titles used to be held. Viewed in the right historical perspective, they have their import, and play their part in making the coronation the coronation a pageant of historical interest and value.

#### A GEORGIAN ROBE.

The King Will Wear Imperial Mantle Worn by George IV.

The Imperial mantle or pall worn by King George IV, will be worn by King George V. at his Coronation. After the coronation of King George IV, the robe became the property of the Lord Great Chamberlain, and thus passed into private hands. It has been offered, as an act of homage, by its owner, to the King, who has signified his acceptance of the gift. The robe is in a perfect state of preservation, having apparently been laid in a cedar box, from which it has recently been taken. It is of the finest cloth of gold, and as fresh in appearance as if it had but just left the loom. It is an admirable example of the handloom industry of the Spitalfields weavers, and has woven into its surface the badges of the three kingdoms of England, Scotland and Ireland, in this respect it presents a "much more harmonious appearance than the robe woven for King Edward, on which the badges were embroidered by hand. The robe is surrounded by a deep fringe of pure gold threads.

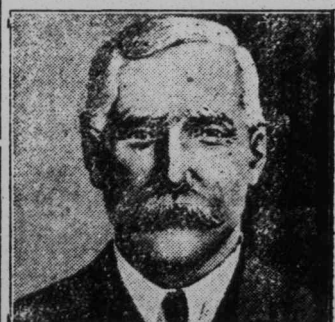
#### Demand for Opera Boxes.
