Hon Mr. Angers recently received an important communication to the effect that the United States had consented to relax their embargo on Canadian cattle so as to allow them to pass in transit from Island Point to Fortland, Me for shipment to England. The privilege now granted could well have been conceded long ago. It is thought, it may be the precursor of the entire removal of the quarantine embargo by the United States on Canadian cattle. Ottawa advises say the impression is gaining ground that any conclusions the government may reach, in the May meeting of the school special will not be brought before the provincial legislature at its present session. He read a great number of declarations of the Legislature, and a resolution of direct taxation; secondly, the loss of a home market for manufacturers; third, the loss of a city market in Canada for farmers; and lastly, the utter absence of the advantage of gaining a market in a single country in the globe for a single Canadian product. It was a simple, straightforward and convincing argument addressed to the reason and business experience of the audience, and made a strong impression on the vast assembly.
