LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

A very bad and fatal shooting accident occurred at Midgell on Saturday afternoon last, by which Mr. Daniel Matheson, aged 35, lost his life. Deceased Mr. Matheson was unmarried, and his sister kept house for him. He was a successful farmer, although he had but one arm, having lost an arm while railroading in the West three years ago. About four o'clock on Saturday afternoon he borrowed a gun from a neighbor to shoot crows that had been taking his chickens. He told his sister he would return home about five o'clock. As he did not return at that hour his sister became uneasy and went to look for him. She found him lying dead by the side of a dyke fence, about twenty-five chains from the house. On the other side of the fence was a double barreled breach-loading gun, muzzle pointing towards the body. Both barrels were empty, and one charge had entered the unfortunate man's body, just above the breast, causing immediate death. Both barrels were loaded when he got the gun, and the inference is that in getting over the fence the hammer caught and the gun was discharged. Corporal McLaughlin was notified, but after viewing the body and ascertaining the facts, an inquest was deemed unnecessary. Deceased was a son of the late James Matheson, of Upton, Dundas, and came to Midgell about two years ago. Four sisters are left to mourn, two in Boston, one at Alberton and other at Midgell. His only brother was killed four years ago by a mining explosion in British Columbia. Deceased was a steady, industrious man and much esteemed by his acquaintances. The funeral took place to Dundas on Monday.

Plague of Flies in London.

Millions of flies have invaded the Cardiff Dock district, and have so infested the principal thoroughfares that pedestrian traffic has been diverted into other streets. Yesterday afternoon, says the London Chronicle of a recent date, the police and dock gatekeepers at the pier head were attacked by a tremendous host, and ran for protection behind the closed doors of the warehouses. The shopkeepers complain bitterly of the invasion, and clerks in the dock warehouses are seriously interrupted in their work. From their appearance, the flies belong to a foreign species. Unlike the British fly, they have long bodies, crawl very slowly, and bite badly. They first made their appearance on Sunday. The sanitary authorities discredited the report that the flies were imported by newly arrived fishing vessels, and state that the insects were first seen during the southerly wind on Sunday afternoon.

Canadian Cruiser Sinks an American Fishing Vessel on Lake Erie.

On the 17th inst., about 9.15 a. m., the Government cruiser Vigilant, Capt. Dunn, sighted a fishing tug about six miles east of Middle Island, Lake Erie, and about five miles north of the boundary line. The captain changed his course and made towards the tug, which proved to be the Grace M., of Lorain, Ohio, Capt. Wm. Galbraith. The tug came towards the Vigilant and when quite near by, Captain Dunn signalled with his whistle for them to slow. No attention was paid to the signal. Then Capt. Dunn whistled to stop, but the tug shot past the Vigilant with full steam. Capt. Dunn turned about and soon overhauled her, but the tug continued to dodge the Vigilant, notwithstanding the fact that Captain Dunn had fired across her bows several times. The Vigilant was again coming up on the tug when she again attempted to cross the Vigilant's bow. Captain Dunn seeing there was likely to be a collision, stopped, and backed full steam, and had his boat well stopped when they came together, but the momentum of the Vigilant was sufficient to roll the Grace M. over, and she sank. Captain Dunn rescued Captain Galbraith, engineer Wm. Rollison and Dr. Peppelwell, fishermen. Two sailors were drowned, named Martin Olson, of Cleveland, and Wm. Anderson, of Lorain. Captain Galbraith of the tug Grace M. admits that Captain Dunn was in no way to blame, and now realizes that he should have obeyed Captain Dunn's signal and stopped his boat when ordered to do so.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A submarine boat was lost near Plymouth England on Thursday. Her crew of four—two officers and men were all lost.

The contract for the new water works tunnel under the Bay has been let by the city of Toronto to M. J. Haney for \$209,000.

Thirty cases of fresh lobsters and oysters from this Province, were sent from Halifax on Thursday last, for the Pacific Coast for experimental purposes.

It is rumored that Hon. Mr. Emmerson Minister of Railways may be appointed Chairman of the Railway Commission at the close of the present session of Parliament, and that Hon. William Pugsley, Attorney General of New Brunswick will be appointed Minister of Railways.

On Thursday the Intercolonial train from Montreal for Little Metis was wrecked at St. Louis. Six cars and the locomotive left the rails, and one thousand feet of road were torn up. Excepting the injuring of the two cooks on the dining car, no one was hurt.

In the by-elections for the House of Commons, held in London and North Oxford, Ontario yesterday, the Government candidates were elected. Hyma's majority in London seems to be 300, and the majority of Smith, Liberal, in North Oxford, is placed at about 250, at the general election in the riding in November Sutherland's majority was over 1,500. Quite a reduction.

Captain Richards President of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company and Mr. Benjamin Rogers director of the Company have lately visited Hamilton Ont., where they inspected the turbine system of steamers. It is said that, as a result of their visit, they will recommend to the company to build a turbine steamer to ply between this Province and the mainland.

A despatch of the 9th, from Chippewa Falls, Wis. says. The west bound passenger train on the Wisconsin Central railroad yesterday plunged into Red Cedar Creek from a steel bridge west of Colfax. Engineer Phillips and fireman Severus and the train hands are believed to be drowned. The tender, baggage and mail cars went down with the bridge and are buried in the water. The rest of the train remained on the track. The centre piece of the bridge was undermined by the high water.

On Sunday last, the Feast of Pentecost, Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral by his Lordship Bishop McDonald. He was assisted by Rev. Dr. Curran, as arch priest, Rev. K. McPherson and R. D. McDonald, D. D., as deacons of honor; Rev. Father Gaudet and Rev. J. B. McIntyre as deacon and sub-deacon of office and Rev. Dr. McLellan as Master of Ceremonies. The sermon of the occasion was preached by Very Rev. Dr. Morrison. His text was from the Gospel of the day and his discourse was a powerful exposition of the effects of the descent of the Holy Ghost on the Apostles. In the evening his Lordship officiated again at Solemn Pontifical Vespers and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The case of Nelson Howatt vs. A. A. LeFurgey came before the election court at Summerside on Monday, the Chief Justice and Judge Fitzgerald presiding. A point was raised by counsel for LeFurgey regarding substituted service, respondent being out of Canada. It was claimed there was no jurisdiction for such service. The court reserved decision on the point and pending this decision on behalf of respondent, the court extended the time of commencing the trial to Tuesday Sept. 5th, next. The trial of the election petition of Bennett McEachern vs. J. J. Hughes set for hearing before Judges Hodgson and Fitzgerald at Georgetown was called in the said Court yesterday and postponed to Tuesday, Sept. 9th, next.

Hon. James Nicholson died at his home at Eldon Saturday last aged 78 years. He was a native of Belfast and spent his whole life in that part of the country. He was a highly respected and influential member of the Liberal Conservative Party and was first elected to the House of Assembly in 1873 and was re-elected at the general election of 1879. In 1882 he was elected to the Legislative Council. In 1887 he became a member of the Executive Council and for a time was Government leader in the Upper House. He leaves to mourn a widow, two sons and one daughter. The sons are Mr. John A. Nicholson M. A. Registrar of McGill University, Montreal and M. S. A. Nicholson, a progressive farmer and one of our rising Provincial politicians. The daughter is Mrs. J. C. Irving Cherry Valley.
