This One Defiant. A third farmer was defiant, and said "Council or no council I am going to cut up meat on the market square or three will be trouble."

The best argument that the consumer could put forward on the question was for one to step forward and buy a good sized chunk of pork.

For the benefit of farmers and others interested it may be pointed out that so far nothing has been done by the council, other than give assent to the market square amendment.
