
But when he did awake to the fact, he was certainly startled. Leaning out of the window, he hailed the man on the box.

Why is Miss ---The W Need for

The Right Hon. James B. Ambassador to the United States a striking article in the new national Review of Missions. Impressions of a Traveller Non-Christian Races."

"The work done in the way of education, for instance, in the East, where missionaries are less occupied in the effort to proselytize than in endeavouring to spread education and enlightenment, and the work done in India, the finance of which extends far and widely and is more beneficial recorded simply in the number of converts, not to speak of rigid South Africa and the Pacific, where the aborigines have been claimed or are being reclaimed, a savagery which in many instances has been cruel and debasing, and the claims which it has supported of the Christian world.

Why So Slow? "No doubt it frequently happens that this is only what must be expected and to over-estimate the progress of the world against all the imperious persecution in the first centuries after it had appeared progress in these last four centuries with all the impulse of civilization behind, should be still in many respects so slow, and the results from perfect?
