**Rules for Automobileists.**

Never start the engine when the car is standing over gasoline. Frequently when filling the gasoline tank some of the fuel finds its way to the ground, either from overflowing or because of

carelessness, in pouring into the filler hole or funnel. To start the engine above this overflow is to invite serious trouble, for it is often that sparks are discharged from the muffler when the engine races, and this is especially true if the muffler contains much soot. Occasionally a leak in the gasolene pipe or tank, or maybe a carburetor float chamber in which the seat of the needle valve needs grinding, will permit of the gasolene forming in a puddle when the car is standing on the street. It is important to stop such leaks and it is better to keep the car in motion than to stand over exposed gasolene, which a match, carelessly thrown in the street, may ignite.

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**Women Going on Treasure Hunt.**

Off to Cocos Island to Find the Hundred Million Dollar Treasure Believed to be Hidden There.

London, July 10.—Another treasure hunting expedition will leave Welsh Port in a few days for Cocos Island to search for the pirate hoard, amounting to nearly \$100,000,000 believed to be hidden there. The voyage is expected to take forty-two days.

Moving picture operators are going with the expedition, and will embark in England, but the principals, including two English women, Mrs. Barry Till and Miss Davies, will join the ship at Panama.

These two women declare they have practically located the whereabouts of the treasure, and a concession has been obtained from the Costa Rican government for the research.
