Supreme Court.

Before the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Johnson.

The Grand Jury was called and addressed by the Chief Justice on the bill of indictment against Joseph Byrne for the manslaughter of Jas. Eales, in March last. It will be remembered that Eales was killed by Byrne starting the engine attached to a rotary plough on which Eales was making repairs. The Chief Justice addressed the Grand Jury at some length, going into the matter very fully.

The Grand Jury then retired to consider their verdict. Morris, K.C., presented to the Court Mr. Frank Summers to be called to the bar. The Chief Justice welcomed the new barrister. Mr. Conroy presented Mr. E. Piment for enrolment as a Solicitor. Mr. Piment was then sworn in as a Solicitor, taking also the oath of allegiance, and signed the roll of Solicitors, and was congratulated by the Bench.

Tessier & Co. vs the Bonaventure Steamship Co.

This was a motion for a day. Mr. McNelly for Plaintiff moves for a day; Mr. Fenelon asks for an early day. The case was set for Friday, November 8th.

Before Mr. Justice Johnson.

The following special jury was sworn: Charles Bradbury, George Neal, Charles Sletor, A. Delgado, R. Williams, S. Moore, J. Taylor, Wm. Butler, John Clarke. This is an action for the abatement of a nuisance, viz. noise and vibration caused by machinery. Kent, K.C., opens plaintiff's case and addresses the jury.

Before the Chief Justice.

The A. E. Williams Machinery Co. vs. James R. Johnson and Job H. Roberts.
This was an action for the price of machinery sold by the plaintiff to the defendant, which machinery was afterwards burnt and insurance money was paid by the insurance company to Job H. Roberts, assignee for the benefit of the creditors of the defendant. Mr. McNelly opened the case for the Plaintiff, and called and examined Mr. Frank Rendell, who testified as to the insurance on machinery.

The Police Court.

A drunk and disorderly who also assaulted Constable Kelly, pleaded guilty, he was fined \$10 or 30 days.

A man charged with being drunk and disorderly in his sister's house was discharged.

A fifteen year old lad was charged with being drunk and disorderly, he was remanded for 8 days.

A drunk was discharged on payment of cash hire.

A lad charged with the larceny of a cash box containing \$9, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to three months in jail.

A man charged for driving a motor car without a license, pleaded guilty. He was fined \$20 or 30 days.

Two cases brought by the Inspector of Chimneys were called and heard.

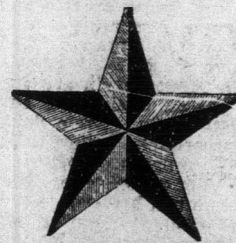

CREW SAFE.

To-day Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, had the accompanying message from Salmonier:—
"McDonald's schooner Bonnie Lass, at Salmonier, broke adrift in yesterday's storm. While endeavouring to reach place of anchorage she capsized and sank. The crew are safe."

Landslide at Petty Harbor.

Friday evening a large section of one of the cliffs of Petty Harbour gave way and tons of rock fell from it. This occurred near a section of the flume which conveys water for the electric power plant, and from 7 to 100 feet of the woodwork surrounding the conduit was badly smashed though the iron work of the flume was not much hurt and the power was not interfered with. A big gang of men have since been making repairs night and day.

He Walked Overboard.

A man named Wm. Jenkins, of Musgrave Harbor, aged 70, had a narrow escape from drowning Saturday night at 10 o'clock. He was going aboard the scho. Effie Belle at Steer Bros. wharf when he went over the head of the pier in the dark. All the men on the schooner were below and hearing his cries, hastened on deck and rescued him in the nick of time, as his strength was fast ebbing away while he clung to the shores of the wharf. The old man suffered much from shock and the coldness of the water.

Fogota Here.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here at 6 a.m. today. She had fine weather going north, and leaving Fogo at 9 p.m. Friday had it fair until Saturday, when a gale of wind from the N. E. sprang up with a high sea, and she remained in Greenspond from 10 a.m. till 2 p.m. yesterday. She made all ports of call and brought up a small freight of fish in casks. Her passengers were: Capt. W. and S. K. Winsor, Messrs. Elliott, Abbott, Templeman and Snelgrove, Messdames Chapman, Stone and White, with 30 steerage.

Sardinian From Philadelphia.

The R. M. S. Sardinian arrived from Philadelphia at 11 o'clock today. The message received five days, during which very stormy weather prevailed. She brought 300 tons of cargo and the following passengers: John Doyle, Patrick Doyle, John St. John, John Hurley, Miss Hurley and Elizabeth Hurley. The ship sails for Glasgow at 7 o'clock this evening, taking as saloon passengers: Miss Riley, Hon. E. R. Bowring, Miss M. Dawe, Mr. Worsley, Miss Worsley, Mrs. Grieve and child, 16 intermediate and 2 in steerage.

Schr. Ashore.

Deputy Minister of Customs LeMessurier was in receipt of the following message to-day:—
"Schooner Annie Syme, John Andrews, master, went on shore at Adam's Cove, yesterday morning; total loss; crew safe."

Bishop & Sons had a similar message. The vessel was owned by T. French, of Tizard's Harbour. She was insured in the Mutual Marine for \$800. She was discharging a cargo of lumber from Birchy Cove when the accident occurred.
