

**Terras Win Tie Cup.**

**CHAMPIONS BADLY DEFEATED.**

The Terra Nova defeated the Peeldians in a fast game of hockey last night by a score of 8 goals to 4. The winning of the Tie Cup put up by the rink directors. Whilst a win for the Terras was not unexpected, it was a great surprise to many to see the Peeldians so badly beaten. From start to finish they were completely outplayed and did not seem to have any chance of winning. The Terras Nova undoubtedly were the very best form they have shown in the season, every man concentrating all his energies on winning this season. The ice was in excellent condition and over 1800 fans witnessed the game. Although the Terras had a lead nearly all their own way, play was very fast throughout. Rawlins set up a splendid exhibition of goal keeping but he did not receive nearly as many shots as Hunt. The latter's mark was certainly up to his old standard but he did not get a real chance to save some of the goals scored against him. Canning played very good individual game and Rendell did some great defence work for the Peeldians. Rendell, got in some very good play and frequently relieved the pressure on his goal. The Peeldians also played well. On the whole, however, the Peeldians seemed to be experiencing an off night. The game was started at 7.30 by M. C. C. Robertson who was referee.

**THE FIRST PERIOD**

Opened with some fast play by both sides. Hardly a minute elapsed, however, before Canning obtained first goal and two minutes later Len Stuck had Hunt for the Terras second goal. The Peeldians soon after netted their only goal for the period through Canning. The Terras seemed to be getting the best of play but some very good tries were made by Rendell. Tait and Winter though to no avail. The Peeldian combination during this part of the game was quite good but the Terras defence eventually broke it up. The period ended with the score 2-1 in favour of the Terras.

**THE SECOND PERIOD**

Was not a minute old when Clouston managed to slip the puck past Hunt for the Terras third goal and two minutes later he secured No. 4. The game now began to play up a bit. Winter after running the length of the rink on the boards beat Rawlins for the second time. This was quickly followed by a run through on the part of Canning who notched up his 5 with a shot which was too much for Hunt. The Terras now had easily the best of play and kept up an almost continuous bombardment of their opponent's goal. Before the period ended, Clouston scored their sixth goal from a pass and Alderice after a tricky bit of play topped up another score for the Peeldians.

**THE THIRD PERIOD**

Was a repetition of the previous two. Repeated efforts to score were made by the Peeldians but whenever their forwards got away they found practically the whole Terra Nova team in front of them forming an impenetrable defence. Two minutes after the start Len Stuck scored No. 7 for the Terras, quickly followed by Clouston with No. 8. Len Stuck repeated his performance soon after, beating Hunt for No. 9. Just before the end, Rendell scored the Peeldians fourth goal at a very good run.

**THE STAR AND MR. MAIN.**

The thing that will cause most speculation on the part of those who watch closely the course of politics, is the position of the St. John's Daily Star, which is at present entirely "on the fence" in the political fight being waged over the Harbor Main election. Our opinion is that something along the following lines is happening. First we incline to the belief that with the unpopularity of the Squifes Government, the Harbor Main candidates on the Government side are making a straight Coakerite appeal to the electors, using all the strength of the F.P.U. for this purpose. We incline to this belief because the Advocate is as intelligent as the Star is quiet.

Further, while Mr. Coaker's strength has waned in districts where he has been tried and found wanting, Harbor Main is new to his appeals, and it is doubtless hoped that where they fall on new and inexperienced ears they will have as great effect as they did in northern districts in 1913 and 1919. Mr. Hawco is an employee of Mr. Coaker's own department of fisheries, and Mr. Furey was a friend of Mr. Coaker's way back in the days when the latter was operator at Port Blandford. Thus both the Government candidates are Mr. Coaker's choice.

Mr. Squires and his paper the Star, may therefore be watching the course of the battle from afar but taking no part. If Mr. Coaker's candidates win, Mr. Squires must continue to accept his lieutenant's dictation if he desires to remain nominal Premier. If on the other hand, Mr. Coaker's candidates should fall, Mr. Squires may think the former has shot his bolt, and that his power is waning, and begin to look for new alliances.

That to our mind is the explanation for the Star's silence. If you know of a better we should be glad to hear it. (Our Northern contemporary, at the time of writing the above, had not, obviously, seen the Star Special Harbor Main edition, containing all kinds of frenzied appeals to the electors of that district.)

Where are the representatives of Twillingate District? Mr. Scammell can secure the services of the aeroplane to take mail for Treaty Shore; the Bonavista representatives are getting the Bonavista branch line cleared up; so are those for Bay de Verde, but our three members are silent. They are now comfortably settled away so why should they worry. Let the public do the worrying, is their motto.

One week passed without a mail and we just secured that was unfortunate. But when it lengthens to two, three and now over four weeks, without any outside mail, and over two without even connection with our next door neighbors that is a little too thin.

Never was such indifference towards their constituency manifested as is manifested by Messrs. Samson and Jennings. What Mr. Jones is doing from the other end we do not know, but if we were in his place, if burning words could fuse the telegraph lines or scorch the ears of those supreme authorities in St. John's, not a wire would be standing and Mr. Murdoch's would be cleaned out of saive and Zambuk.

If we can do without mails this way we might as well save the country several hundred thousand dollars yearly and do without the Postal Department entirely.
