LANCE R. ANDREWS.

Not unexpectedly came the final call to the home of Lance R. Andrews, Waterford Bridge Road, in the early hours of last evening, when his soul left its earthly tenement, and was wafted into eternity. The appeal of his spirit touched the heart, and the end came without pain or without protest, for throwing off its earthly shackles the spirit passed into the paradise of rest occupied by that unnumbered multitude who await the final reward promised by the Creator, when life eternal will be the portion of all whose terrestrial life have been borne with that patience and resignation to the divine will, which characterized the closing hours of the life of him whom his relatives mourn today.

The deceased was one of these unassuming characters, who early in life engaged in the pursuits of the calling for which he felt himself best fitted, and during his business activity impressed all those with whom he had dealings with the integrity of his conduct, and oneness of purpose. Unfortunately the "fell destroyer"—tuberculosis—invaded the physical body, and though an heroic fight was made against the ravages of the disease, and the devoted ministrations of wife and family brought into combat with its insidious influence, nothing availed except to prolong the vital spark, until at length the demand on the feeble flame was too great and it became extinguished.

Lance Andrews will perhaps be better known to many as a partner in the firm of Cowan & Andrews, whose business ramifications extended over a large stretch of territory, and brought the junior partner into contact with many men from outport and city alike. A few years ago, failing health compelled his retirement from commercial activities, and since then, at his country residence, he has been given all the care and attention that loving and affectionate service could encompass.

He was the elder son of Nathan and the late Elfrida Andrews, and married, after his retirement from business, Ethel, daughter of Mary and the late William Hussey of South River, Port de Grave District, who with the father of the deceased, a brother, Ralph, in England, a sister, Daisy in Montreal, are left to mourn their sad and irreparable loss, with whom in the sad and lonely hours of bereavement the Telegram asks leave to join in sympathy. The funeral takes place from the residence of the father of the deceased, Waterford Bridge Road, at 2:30 o'clock to-morrow (Saturday) afternoon, and friends will accept this as the only intimation.

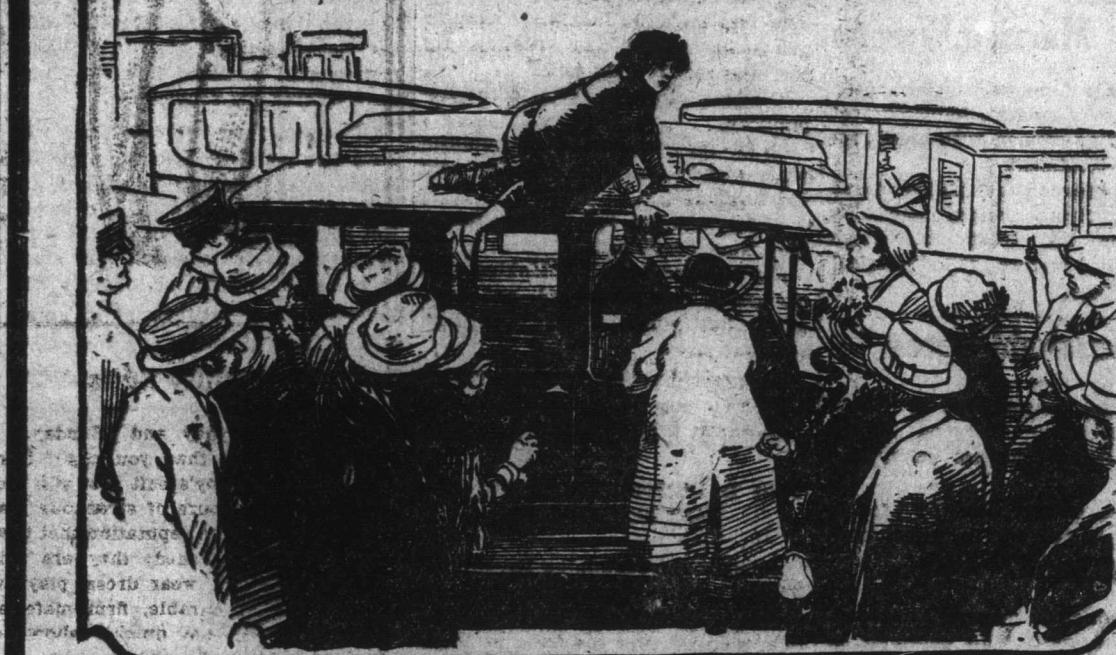
