# Consolidation and Amendment of the Liquor Laws.

Hon. Mr. Crooks, Provincial Treas urer, has introduced a Bill to "amend and consolidate the Law for the Sale of Fermented or Spirituous Liquors. As it is a matter closely affecting the welfare of the community, we have condensed the following statement of its provisions from the more lengthy summary of The Globe. In introducing the matter, our contemporary remarks upon the importance of such legislation not being in advance of public opinion, for public opinion alone can give it profitable operation; and most people will agree in the opinion that the Bill, whilst thorough, is not of too radical or sweeping a character

The Bill provides that all licenses are to come from an official cailed the "Issuer of Licenses," who is to be appointed by each county, city or municipality. He countersigns the licenses and receives the Provincial fees, which he forwards to the Provincial Treasurer, less 6 per cent. for himself. Every house of public entertainment must conspicuously display its license, or incur a penalty of \$2.

This is good feature; and so is the provisin that those who have a shop or wholesale license see not allowed even to give any intoxicating liquois to be consumed on the precursors ander a paratry of 20.
