Then, in the second place, the atepayers are generally impressed with the belief that this road would be of little benefit to them. What they want is not a road run-What they want is not a road running east and west, but one running north and south, which will touch Guelph and Hamilton. These are the great markets most frequented by the farmers, and when aid is required to build this line, which is already projected, we are satisfied that the ratepayers of Puslinch would give three times ten thousand dollars—and perhaps more—to assist in building it. The present, therefore, is a good time for agitating the construction of this line. It would shorten the distance between Guelph and Hamilton by at least twenty miles. It would greatly benefit not only this town, and the Ambitious City, but the farmers in Puslinch, Flamboro and other Townships, and moreover form an almost direct line of railway from the head of Lake Ontario to Lake Iluron at Southampton. We trust that the people of Hamilton and Guelph will not lose sight of this enterprise, and there is no better time than the present for bringing it fully under the attention of all parties interested in it. ning east and west, but one running

The Committee on the North-West troubles and amnesty question met again on Saturday, when Bishor Tache was again examined at grea ength. It is rumored that the evidence given has been of great in-terest as affecting the important question submitted to the Committee for investigation.

ENGLISH FINANCES.—The annual budget submitted to the English House of Commons shows that the total gross revenue of the United Kingdom in the year ended March 31st, 1874, amounted to £77,395,000, exceeding the lowest estimates by £3,574,000. The total gross expenditure for the same period was £76,456,000. This includes the sum paid for the Geneva Award, but does not include the expenses of the Ashantee War. The excess of expenditure over estimates was £1,186,000. The total revenue for the current financial year ending March 31st, 1875, is estimated at £77,795,000, and the total expenditure at £72,503,000, leaving a surplus of £5,492,000. These e-timates are virtually based on Mr. Gladstone's figures.

Sir Stafford Northcote proposes to dispose of the surplus by reducing the Income Tax by one penny in the pound, abolishing the duties on sugar from the 1st of May, creating additional terminable annuities to the amount of £450,000, reducing the national debt £7,000,000 in ten years, contributing £1,00,000. to the relief of local taxation, and abolishing horse licenses. These measures, it is estimated, will absorb £5,309,000 of surplus, leaving a residue of £462,000.
