Mr. Hyman, member for London, visited his constituents and expressed himself as atrongly opposed to the public interests

being sacrificed upon any such pretext. When Mr. Hyman returned to Ottawa he was assailed by these men for telling the truth outside the House, while the

plundering was still under investigation. The whole country became interested in the principle laid down by Mr. Hyman, which was that the disposal of public money should be investigated by the Public Accounts Committee, no matter whether the spender or receiver was a page or a

But the eix Ministers vigorously de nounced Mr. Hyman, the chairman of the Partisan Committee censured him, and the London Free Press, instead of commending the pluck and ability shown by the repre-sentative of the city in battling for a great principle, sneered at him as being "called down" and "sat upon" by his fellow mem-

The wisdom of Mr. Hyman's course was peedily vindicated. With a none too scrupulous crowd to contend against, it was difficult to get a matter of this kind out of the hands of the committee and into that of Parliament, but in a day or two after the assault on the representative for London, Sir Richard Cartwright brought forward a resolution in the House of Commons which unreservedly took up the position assumed by Mr. Hyman—that the Public Accounts Committee of Parliament shall have a right to investigate every money payment, no matter though Minis-ters of the Crown may be brought into dis-Pepute by the exposure.

The resolution was so manifestly just that it was carried unanimously, and the six Ministers, including Messrs. Foster, Haggart and Chapleau sat calm'y by while Mr. Hyman was vindicated in his criticism and while the great principle for which he man-fully cont ended was indorsed by the house.

Though Mr. Hyman had done nothing else than was thus accomplished through his straightforward protest against the financial jugglery that has in recent years cost the taxpayers of the Dominion millions of dollars, taken from them by peculations and contract jobbery, he would be entitled to the indorsation and support of his con-stituents. Independent men like him are needed at Ottawa, and there are many Con-parvatives as well as Liberals in London

The Canadian Gazette, published in the British metropolis, discussing the question

"It would be difficult to imagine a more ligid election law than that in force in Canada. Every man who takes an active part in the contest on behalf of a candidate is thereby constituted an agent, though he receives no appointment, and, it may be, is quite unknown to the candidate or his committee. Let any one of these thousand and one irresponsible workers pay a dollar to bring an elector to the pill, and the election is worded. Thus same rigidity applies to all the doings of a candidate and his aupporters."
