#### MIDDLESEX ASSIZES.

Judgment for Detendant in Neeley vs. Millor-Fraser vs. Rogers-Queen vs. Millor Dismissed.

Miller Dismissed.

Neeley vs. Miller, a civil action tried with a jury, was the next case called. The plaintiff is a partner in a firm who manufacture pitching machines and sheaf liliters at Dorchester Station. The defendant resides in the township of Enniskillen Lambton county, and in January 1891, entered into an agreement with the plaintiff to act as agent for him. The condition was that the defendant should take twelve machines at \$17 cach. The retail price ranged from \$26 to \$30. The plaintiff was to have the machines put on the train at Dorchester Station and addressed to the defendant at Oil Springs. The machines were shipped on June 12, 1891, and an invoice was sent. The defendant did not acknowledge the receipt of the machines or invoice. Neeley afterwards wrote to Miller, sending him a note to sign for the payment of the contract. The note was never returned. H. B. Elliot appeared for the prosecution, and W. R. Meredith, Q.C., for the defense.

In Neeley vs. Miller, which occupied the whole of Saturday afternoon, the defense set up was that there was misrepresentation on the part of the plaintiff. The defendant claimed that he ordered from the plaintiff only one machine instead of twelve. Judgment was given for the defendant.

Fraser vs. Rogers (non-jury) was the first case called this morning. M. J. Woodward & Co., oil merchants of Petrolea, failed in July, 1891, with liabilities of about \$110,000. Samuel Rogers & Co., oil merchants of Toronto, took possession of the refinery and used certain oils and other materials on the premises. John Fraser, the plaintiff and assignee, sues to recover the assets of the assignee for the benefit of the creditors. Maclaren & Co., of Petrolea, with Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., as counsel, are solicitors for the defendant, and Dawson, Weir & Greenizen, of Petrolea, for the plaintiffs. W. R. Meredith, Q.C., is pleading for the plaintiffs. This case occupied the time of the court at the Sarnia Assizes for two days, but by an order from Mr. Justice Street was adjourned and transferred to the London Assizes. With the object in view of discharging the jury as soon as possible, this case has been adjourned until after the two remaining gury cases—Bradden vs. Crozier (civil) and Queen vs. Miller (criminal)—have been tried.

when court resumed after dinner the remaining criminal case, Queen vs. Walter and John Miller, was called. The plaintiff was Samuel Plain, an Indian, living on the Chippewa reserve. Four horses owned by the father of the defendants were impounded by Louis Deleary, and the defendants were charged with having broken into the pound and rescued the animals. Mr. McKillop, for the Crown, could not prove sufficiently the existence of the bylaw for the appointment of the pound-keeper, and the case was suddenly ended, the prisoners being discharged.

Bradden vs. Crozier, the last jury case on the docket, was next called. The plaintiff is a young man who carried on business as a tinsmith in the village of Mount Brydges. He rented his shop for a period of three years from the defendant, John Crozier, at a rontal of \$50 a year, payable quarterly. Bradden, it is said, wished to sell out. The last quarter's rent fell due on a Sunday, and was not paid that day, but when Bradden called two or three days afterwards to pay it Crozier refused to accept the money offered, as he claimed more, not as rent, but for pasturage and expenses. Crozier then seized the goods, worth about \$525, and refused to give them up. The suit was entered to recover damages for the seizure. The case was going on.

Murder and Suicide.

New York, May 9.—Abel Smith, colored, 23 years old, living at Carnarsic, quarreled with his wife, Miranda, last night. Miranda grabbed two knives, and, with one in each hand, sought to defend herself from the blows Smith rained upon her. Smith seized a gun and shot her through the heart. He then rushed to the railroad track, threw himself under a train and was killed. His body was torn into bits and strewn for yards along the road. When neighbors entered the Smith house they found the wife's body lying upon the floor with blood pouring in streams from her wound. In each hand was held a knife. The woman was dead. 
