FAIR WEATHER.

TORONTO, Oct. 8.—11 p.m.—The storm
central over Lake Superior yesterday has
moved eastward with diminished energy
and is now over Northern Quebec. It has
caused a moderate gale and rain in the
lake district, and is giving unsettled
weather in Eastern Canada. In the North-
west the depression from the Pacific is
causing higher temperature and strong
winds.

Jones and P. Henderson. There is still
required about \$400 to clear the opening
expenses, and Ad. E. T. Miller, the
superintendent of the home (of the Salva-
tion Citadel, Clarence street), will be
pleased to wait on the citizens to receive
subscriptions either of money or things
necessary to fit up the home, so as to get
the institution ready for the opening. It
is not the army's intention to pauperize, but
to help a man to help himself.

Mantell Tonight.

There are few plays of the modern school
of drama which have held the stage longer
than the "Corsican Brothers," which the
great Dumas evolved while at the height
of his popularity. Although he has written
an almost countless number of romances,
yet in none of them do his marvelous gifts
as a novelist appear to better advantage
than in this stirring dramatic romance of
the twin brothers, del Franchi. Revivals
of the drama have taken place every few
years, and the latest with the clever and
painstaking young actor, Robert Mantell,
in the dual role of Louis and Fabien del
Franchi. In this play Mr. Mantell has an
excellent opportunity to display his abilities
as a romantic actor, and his sudden changes
as a melancholy Louis to the gay
and light-hearted Fabien have gained him
the favor of the most captious critics. The
title of "The Corsican Brothers" used
by Mr. Mantell, as well as the mechanical
effects, visions, vampires, tricks, traps,
apparitions, scenery, costumes, etc., is
similar to that presented a few years ago
by Henry Irving at the Lyceum Theatre in
London, and differs considerably from the
one formerly played here. This version is
divided into six acts and tableaux, and
opens with a scene at Louis' Chambers in
Paris, ending with the death of Fabien at
their Corsican home.

REV. J. R. ADAMS ORDAINED

As Resident Pastor of the First Con-
gregational Church—Addresses
by Rev. Dr. Wild and Rev.
Messrs. Hay and
Silcox.

Rev. J. R. Adams, of this city, is now
the official resident pastor of the First Con-
gregational Church, being assistant to Rev.
Dr. Wild. The impressive ordination
services were conducted last evening before
a large number of the congregation.

Neighboring Congregational ministers met
in council yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock,
the following being present: Rev. Messrs.
Dr. Wild, Hay, Silcox, Clark and Messrs.
Cannon, Langridge and Marshall. Rev.
Mr. Hay was appointed chairman and Rev.
Mr. Silcox secretary.

Rev. J. R. Adams was examined; his
papers were found to be exceedingly satis-
factory, and he also gave a verbal state-
ment of his doctrinal belief. Mr. Adams,
being requested to withdraw, Rev. Dr. Wild
moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. Clark,
"That this council has heard Mr. Adams
with reference to his call to the ministry,
doctrinal belief, etc., and that we report
him entirely satisfactory, and we proceed
with the ordination service."

In the evening Rev. Mr. Hay occu-
pied the chair and called on the
secretary to read the report of the
council. Rev. J. R. Adams was asked the
following questions by Rev. B. Hay: 1.
Why are you a Christian? 2. What led
you to seeking the Christian ministry? 3.
What has led to your connection with
this church as pastor?

Mr. Adams replied in a satisfactory man-
ner to all questions. A scripture lesson
was then read by Rev. Mr. Silcox, and
Rev. Dr. Wild delivered the sermon, the
new pastor, taking as his text I. Corin-
thians, xiv., 2. "But he that prophesieth
edificateth unto men to edification and
exhortation and comfort." Dr. Wild's
remarks were earnest and to the point.
He spoke of the change in ministerial
work, and told his assistant to preach
what he believed, to be cheerful, to be a
man, a keeper of secrets, and a thoroughly
trustworthy pastor.

Rev. Mr. Clark made the ordination
prayer, and at its conclusion tendered
Rev. Mr. Adams the right hand of
fellowship for the council and the
congregation. An address of welcome was
given by Rev. Mr. Silcox. Rev. Mr. Hay
very briefly delivered the address to the
people. The Misses Muter and Meek sang
a duet during the offertory. After the
visiting hymns had been invited to the
meeting this evening the assemblage
broke up with the doxology.
